Fall Festival, Wine Tasting at Historic Cabin


The Community House Fall Festival is Saturday, Sept. 24, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the historic log cabin on Community House Road.



AMA Publishes Asher's Tumor Study

In its July 26 issue, the Journal of the American Medical Association published an international brain tumor research study co-authored by Charlotte neurosurgeon Anthony Asher.

Asher is with Carolina
Neurosurgery & Spine Associates,
which has a Ballantyne office.
The article reported results of a
clinical research trial originating in
Charlotte a decade ago comparing
the effects of treating patients
with a combination of whole brain
radiation and focused radiation,
versus focused radiation alone.

"First and most directly, this study provides definitive evidence that patients with one to three brain metastases should no longer receive routine whole brain radiation

therapy, and should be treated with focused therapy alone to better preserve cognitive function and quality of life," Asher says.

Asher recently presented his findings at the 2016 American Association of Neurological Surgeons Annual Scientific Meeting, where he received the Leksell Radiosurgery Award for his research.



Guild Tour Includes Local Kitchens


For the first time, the Symphony Guild of Charlotte's Heart of the Home Kitchen Tour features kitchens in two Ballantyne homes.

segment of the group for breakfast every first Thursday of the month, from 7:30 a.m. to 9 a.m. at Another Broken Egg Café in Ballantyne. Approximately 30 people attend.

Basenspiler schedules the meetings early in the morning so participants can go about their day afterward. Over breakfast, veterans engage in what Basenspiler calls "camaraderie-based networking." She likens the experience to the chow hall in the military, where veterans get away from the serious side of their service and relax.

"Transitioning to the civilian way of life brings challenges," she says. "These gatherings let veterans share their stories, questions and successes. It's a place of trust and authenticity."

Former senior Air Force officer Michael Krueger, a Charlotte native and Ballantyne resident, has attended Charlotte Veterans Network lunches since 2012 when he retired from his last assignment in Virginia and moved back to Charlotte. A Realtor® with Helen Adams Realty, he now attends the breakfasts as well, noting substantial benefits.

"I rarely leave a breakfast empty handed, most times with a new contact or special event to attend," he says. "It's more than just a job fair — there are takeaways that could impact your whole culture (or lifestyle), which is what many veterans miss after transitioning."

The group gets right to work with little chitchat. The vibe is cordial and respectful, but the writers


are not there to socialize or eat. They share one laser focus: getting published.





Attendee John Powell, a Republican who ran for Charlotte City Council in 2015, says: "I was inspired by Ed's coffees to run for office."







'Spice Up Your **Life**'

Laotian Couple Serves Up Asian Array at Bahn Thai

FOR MORE THAN 20 YEARS CHARLOTTE HAS BEEN HOME FOR STEVEN AND AMPHAY PHILAVANE, but the restaurant world is still relatively new to the couple who came to the U.S. from Laos. After many years in traditional business careers, they were ready for a change — and a challenge — so they opened Bahn Thai in Toringdon about three years ago.

Amphay Philavane, who goes by "Amp," says it took a while to find the ideal location, "where people don't like to cook." That's a wise insight about the modern lifestyle that makes it simpler for busy residents and commuters to pick up a meal than prepare one of their own. Having offices and hotels nearby guarantees a steady stream of patrons to the sleekly appointed restaurant.

"Bahn" means house or home, and Bahn Thai offers a good selection of traditional Asian dishes. These include sushi, stir-fry combinations and curries not only from the family's homeland but from neighboring countries as well.

Ginger and its root relative galangal are mainstays of the cuisine, along with tamarind pulp from pods that grow on trees in the tropics.

Flavor Fest

Tom yum is the Thai soup of tomatoes and sliced mushrooms that's pungent but not overly spicy. The som tum salad of shredded green papaya, peanuts, chili peppers, carrots, tomatoes and green beans topped with shrimp is authentically Laotian. With a dressing

that's a mixture of traditional fish sauce, lime juice and palm sugar, the salad has a complex, sweet and tangy flavor.

Bahn Thai's signature dish is Volcano Fish. It's a filet of red snapper that's deep fried and served in a colorful presentation with ripe mangoes and broccoli in a sweet-and-sour sauce. The restaurant's crispy duck entree is seasoned and then battered, fried and served with cilantro, mild red

onions and a juicy tamarind sauce.

The Ballantyne Sushi Roll boasts a creative combination of shrimp, crab, masago (red caviar), scallions, cream cheese, smoked salmon and avocado. Coconut milk

adds mildness to curries, such as the red curry dish known as gaeng dang, flavored with basil leaves. Like many menu choices, gaeng dang is easily adaptable for vegetarians and meat eaters alike. The level of "heat" each diner prefers is always a matter of personal preference, but energetic servers wear T-shirts that playfully proclaim "Spice Up Your Life at Bahn Thai."

Finger Lickin' Dessert

For dessert, mango with sweet rice is a rich treat infused with coconut milk. Aficionados know it's

not only acceptable but a Laotian tradition to forgo a spoon and eat the dessert with one's fingers.

Bahn Thai serves lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday and is closed Sunday. The lunch menu is a scaled-down version of the dinner menu. Many items are naturally gluten free, and gluten-free soy sauce

is available on request. Beer and wine are served.

These days, most of the extended Philavane family lives in the Charlotte area. Niece Emily Douangmichit, who has worked at the restaurant since it opened, is the assistant manager. Some in-laws staff the kitchen and dining room.

As newcomers join the neighbors and regular customers who frequent this busy spot, they all enjoy the warmth of home that has traveled from half a world away to Bahn Thai. 🕒



Superfan Frenzy





"We had a blast," Shane recalls. "It was like spring break for adults."



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

Take It **Outside!**

Audubon Amphitheater Offers Nature Setting for School Lessons

"A true conservationist is a man who knows that the world is not given by his fathers, but borrowed from his children."

THAT OBSERVATION by John James Audubon, the 19th century American naturalist and wildlife artist, has never been more relevant as people today recognize the need to understand and protect Mother Nature. For that reason, The Bissell Companies is inviting Ballantyne-area teachers and school groups to consider using the

Audubon Amphitheater in Ballantyne Corporate Park (BCP) for class lessons about conservation, the environment and other topics.

Looking out on the pond on the 17th hole of The Golf Club at Ballantyne, the beautifully landscaped pocket park features a manicured lawn with two semi-circular tiers of large, flat rocks that serve as seating for 100 people.



The outdoor facility also includes six picnic tables, a gazebo and "The Necessary," an on-site restroom. Close by in the 17th Pond Event Area is a fishing dock stocked with fish food and a bench for anglers engaged in the conservation practice of catch and release.

Built in 2012

"The vision was to transform the area into a park that could be used for outdoor learning opportunities and social gatherings," says H.C. "Smoky" Bissell, chairman of Bissell. "We wanted it to be a place in Ballantyne Corporate Park where tenants and visitors would come to enjoy fresh air, eat lunch, read a book or take a leisurely walk." Built in 2012, the amphitheater underwent a rigorous certification process to qualify as an Audubon cooperative sanctuary.

To date, BCP tenants have used the site for company picnics and team-building exercises. Recently, the Endhaven Elementary Girls Engaged in Math and Science Club, the "GEMS," visited the amphitheater for a workshop led by Debbie Foster, founding member of Habitat and Wildlife Keepers.

In a one-hour seminar, the third and fourth graders learned about healthy habitats and how to use binoculars and went on a wildlife hike, according to the school PTA's Facebook page. The students spotted butterflies, bumblebees, a dragonfly, fish, rabbits, lizards, birds, a nest of bluebird eggs and a great blue heron. After the hike,

they learned about bird watching and the many species that can be seen in the Corporate Park.

'Possibilities are Endless'

The success of this first educational experience prompted The Bissell Companies to promote the Audubon Amphitheater as an outdoor classroom. "With Bissell's ongoing commitment to building a stronger future for our community, we would love to offer this space as an opportunity to connect local

students with nature through on-site workshops," says Hailey Rorie, the organization's community director.

Ideas include studies on wildlife habitats, bird identification and sustainability, as well as field trips exploring science topics at various grade levels. "We would also encourage music, art and reading experiences," Rorie adds. "The possibilities are endless, and we just want to make local schools aware of this opportunity."

Fap Year



TAKING PART IN A MISSION
TRIP IS A POPULAR ACTIVITY
for many Ballantyne youth,
but taking an extended time
before college to see the world
and volunteer — a gap year —
can bring a whole new level of
awareness. Even Malia Obama
is taking that route before
starting Harvard in fall 2017.

Davidson graduate Aly Dove, 22, spent a gap semester in Africa, on a hospital ship in Togo with the international charity Mercy Ships when she was 18.

She graduated high school a semester early and raised the required funds for a spot on the ship by working with kids' programs at the Morrison YMCA, supplementing her income with donations from family and friends.

Her position on the ship required working 20 to 30 hours a week, greeting guests and setting up rooms, while shadowing medical personnel and living in a 10-berth room with women from all over the world.




While working in Togo, Aly Dove taught African children how to use a camera. Her job was working on the hospital ship Africa Mercy, which provided free care to residents.

"One of the neatest aspects of my gap year was the international community I experienced on the ship," Dove says. "It became customary to hear conversations in different languages as I walked across the ship.'

Time spent on volunteer excursions working with local children off the ship was equally valuable. "As a photographer, I realized how power dynamics are shifted when the camera is placed in the hands of a child. Photography is instant and accessible, and the kids could express themselves creatively with very little training.

At Davidson College, Dove received a grant to begin YouthMap (Youth Marketing and Photography), which teaches disadvantaged young people about photography and the editing process. Students give back to their communities by taking photographs that local nonprofits can use in their marketing.

"The best thing I learned during my gap year is that you are there for a short time, so you can't change anything for the long term," says Dove, who now works for Outdoor Ed as an international program instructor in Massachusetts. "It's better to take what

you've learned and make a difference back in your own community."

Rising college freshman Caroline Cary was ready for a new adventure after graduating from Charlotte Latin School in May 2015. "Charlotte Latin was very challenging academically, and I was exhausted after high school," recalls Cary, 19. "I needed to embrace learning again, and having time away to explore and meet people all over the world gave me a renewed love of learning."

She applied "early decision" to Denison her senior year of high school, and her parents said if she received a scholarship to college, she could do a gap year. She got her acceptance and scholarship offer and applied to Youth International, where she volunteered and explored South America for the first semester.

Trek into the Andes

In Peru, Cary tested her physical and mental strength when she and others embarked on a four-day trek into the Andes Mountains, hiking through rainforest and blizzard-like conditions, finally arriving at the ancient Incan archaeological site of Machu Picchu.

"I have never been a hiker so pushing myself and reaching that goal was a very emotional experience for me," explains Cary. And she was finally able to use the Spanish she had studied for years at Latin.

Cary then came home to Charlotte, worked for two months and headed off to Southeast Asia with Carpe


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Diem Education for second semester. A highlight was spending time with teenaged Buddhist monks in Thailand. "Buddhism teaches us to live in the moment," she says. "Many distractions today keep us from this, but it is so important, and this lesson will stay with me forever."

Only 18 years old, Katey Shehan is already a veteran of four mission trips to Haiti through Forest Hills Church and several mission trips in the U.S.

72 BALLANTYNE MAGAZINE **FALL 2016** Kell High School, Shehan plans to go to Nicaragua in the fall with Adventures in Missions and then back to Haiti as an intern in the spring with Mission of Hope. She was accepted at Appalachian State and plans to enroll in fall 2017.

Raising Money

Shehan's parents have provided emotional support but told her the financial piece was up to her. Mission of Hope volunteers raise money for their own lodging, food, airfare, clothing and medical expenses, which can be costly. Shehan has worked two jobs — at Mellow Mushroom restaurant

and the Morrison Y — and sold T-shirts. "I love to shop with friends but gave most of that up," she says. "But I'm able to save the money I need to fund my trip."

During her gap year, Shehan hopes to lead a group painting houses, planting fruit-bearing trees that the local people can eat or sell and helping distribute goats they can use for food, milk or to sell.

"The Haitian people are so relaxed and relational," she notes. "They share their stories and are so happy to see us. I keep up on Facebook with a lot of the kids I met there, and I can't wait to go back."



GAP YEARS AT A GLANCE

The American Gap Association is a nonprofit accreditation and standards-setting organization for gap years, recognized by the U.S. Department of Justice and the Federal Trade Commission. According to the association:

- The trend of American students pursuing a gap year is increasing, with females more likely than males to pursue it.
- Within one year of completing a gap year, 90 percent of students are actively enrolled in a four-year institution.
- Many individual gap-year programs offer scholarships or tuition reductions to bring programs within financial reach.

Thoughtful Gift-Giving

How to Remember People in Ways They Appreciate

WHETHER IT'S FOR A BIRTHDAY, HOLIDAY OR SIMPLY A "THANK YOU," a thoughtful gift resonates with the recipient and giver alike. The recipient enjoys the pleasure of something meaningful, and the giver receives the satisfaction of communicating appreciation in a significant way.

If you wait until the last minute, you run the risk of picking something that doesn't align with the recipient, spending more money to just end the experience or not finding anything at all.

Do have a gift closet.

A well-stocked gift closet is a place in your home that contains gift options for many occasions — or even a "just because" gift. Such closets help eliminate the anxiety of finding the perfect gift at the last minute.

While the gift closet could be any space, ranging from a cabinet to an under-the-bed storage container, the most important part is the contents. I recommend items like

candles, coffee-table books and wine as gifts that can be a great fit for many "thank you's," holidays and celebrations. I consider such gifts evergreen, that is, relevant any time of the year.

Don't stop with the gift; pay attention to its presentation.

Once you have picked out a gift the recipient will love, the hard part is over and you are almost done. The final step is packaging. It is important to consider the entire presentation.

If wrapping is a skill you lack, consider taking the gift to a local store that provides this service.

Don't be afraid to use nontraditional



wrapping materials such as denim, burlap or even the Sunday newspaper. In addition, bows, ribbons or a flower stem or two can be great accents that add a finishing touch to a pretty presentation.



KIDS GET BOOST FROM HOOPTEE




Local celebrities, athletes and golfers attended this year's event, which raised money for children to attend Achievements Unlimited Basketball School, among other programs.

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IN 2015 AFTER AMERICAN PHAROAH SWEPT THE TRIPLE CROWN AND BREEDER'S CUP Classic to become the first horse to win thoroughbred racing's Grand Slam, he made tracks for his old Kentucky home. Now enjoying life at Ashford Stud near Lexington in the heart of Bluegrass Country, the celebrity stallion is just one of the star attractions in this city dubbed "The Horse Capital of the World."

Surrounded by rolling hills dotted by more than 100 picturesque horse farms, Lexington is equally famous as the epicenter of Kentucky bourbon distilleries that produce this country's only native spirit, according to the Kentucky Distillers Association. Add a splash of Southern smalltown feel and you have an original American destination.

A six-hour drive from Charlotte over the Blue Ridge Mountains, Lexington is accessible by direct flights on American Airlines as well.

Lexington native Chad Baker team lead for INT Technologies in Charlotte and president of the city's University of Kentucky alumni chapter often goes home for games and to reconnect with family.

"Fall is one of the most beautiful times of year given the foliage change," he says, referring to the cornucopia of gold, crimson and burnt orange boughs that line byways and create a glorious show of color against bluegrass meadows.

Visitors to Lexington, Ky., can choose among three self-guided tours through farms that make up "The Horse Capital of the World."

Downtown Lexington is an ideal place to stay. Baker recommends the trendy 21c Museum Hotel inside the beaux-arts Fayette National Bank Building. Other options include Campbell House, rich in tradition, or Gratz Park Inn, a historic hotel with authentic



Kentucky atmosphere and an upscale restaurant, Distilled, run by esteemed local chef Mark Wombles. Family-priced accommodations are available at every major hotel brand as well.

After a breakfast feedbag at Doodles or Wild Eggs, head to the Lexington Visitors Center at 401 West Main Street to obtain the **Bluegrass Country Driving Tour** map, which details three selfguided circuits that wind through

escape

scenic pasturelands of America's most iconic horse farms. Each route features historic sites and quaint country stores or lunch spots, including Wallace Station and Windy Corner Market, two eateries owned by Lexington superstar chef Ouita Michel. Most visitors drive — each circuit takes an hour — but others cycle to fully experience the gorgeous views.

Those champing at the bit to get up close and personal with racing thoroughbreds can take professionally guided farm tours that include selfie ops at renowned








Top: Horses silhouetted in the morning mist are a lovely sight in Bluegrass Country.

operations like Claiborne Farm, where a tombstone marks the grave of beloved Secretariat. This year approximately 3,000 visitors have also gotten tickets in advance to meet and greet the magnificent American Pharoah (he is usually gone from July to January).





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
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

No visit to Lexington would be complete without an afternoon at Keeneland Race Course, a national historic landmark with a genteel aura and beautiful grounds. "Keeneland is not to be missed," Baker agrees, advising visitors during fall or spring meets to dress to impress,

bring your wallet and harbor an appetite for chili. "Betologists are there to help beginners," he adds, noting that he buys an entrance ticket and stands by the rail to catch the action.

Shots and Brews

Known by early settlers as "the water of life," Kentucky bourbon is considered by many the world's premium whiskey for its smooth taste imparted by the water used in its







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
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making — which springs from limestone-rich ground around Lexington. Since distillery tours involve sampling straight up, it's advisable to go by bus; although, cyclists seeking to go where the spirit leads them — so to speak — can pedal it off by doing the entire Kentucky Bourbon Trail. Baker's top distillery picks include Buffalo Trace, Four Roses Bourbon and Brown-Forman.


In addition to its hallowed

reputation as the birthplace of bourbon, the Lexington area is a fount for master craft brewers and distillers. The Brewgrass Trail is a chance to visit eight of the best. Baker's preferred local brewers include West Sixth. Country Boy. Ethereal and Blue Stallion.

Beyond Grits

Lexington's culinary scene is as inventive as its culture. Top foodie haunts



include Lockbox at 21c Museum Hotel, where chef Jonathan Searle puts Kentucky twists on dishes that recall Southern picnics. In the up-and-coming Pepper district, site of a former distillery, chef Mark Jensen has parlayed his food-truck chops into Middle Fork Kitchen Bar, recently named to the Top 100 Restaurants on Open Table.

To hobnob with the horsey set, book a reservation at Dudley's

on Short, Lexington's oldest white-tablecloth establishment, famous for its bourbon selection and rooftop patio. Coles 735 Main, an upscale but casual dining spot, and County Club, specializing in smoked meats, are other popular dine-ins.

Nothing gets more local with food, though, than burgoo, a spicy stew concocted of chicken and who knows what else. Baker jokes that Keeneland sometimes refers to it as "what didn't make it around the track." Instead, he suggests


trying beer cheese. "We're pretty wild about it," he says, explaining the cheese is infused with flat beer and spices and turned into a spread or dip. He personally goes for the Beer Cheese Burger at Lynagh's Irish Pub.

Another local favorite worth sampling is Ale-8-One, an unusual caffeinated ginger ale and citrus-blend soda with a kick that Baker insists most locals find addictive.

"It can be safely said that Lexington likes to have a good time and offers some of the most beautiful backdrops in the country," Baker observes. "The people are also genuinely nice and friendly."

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


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
