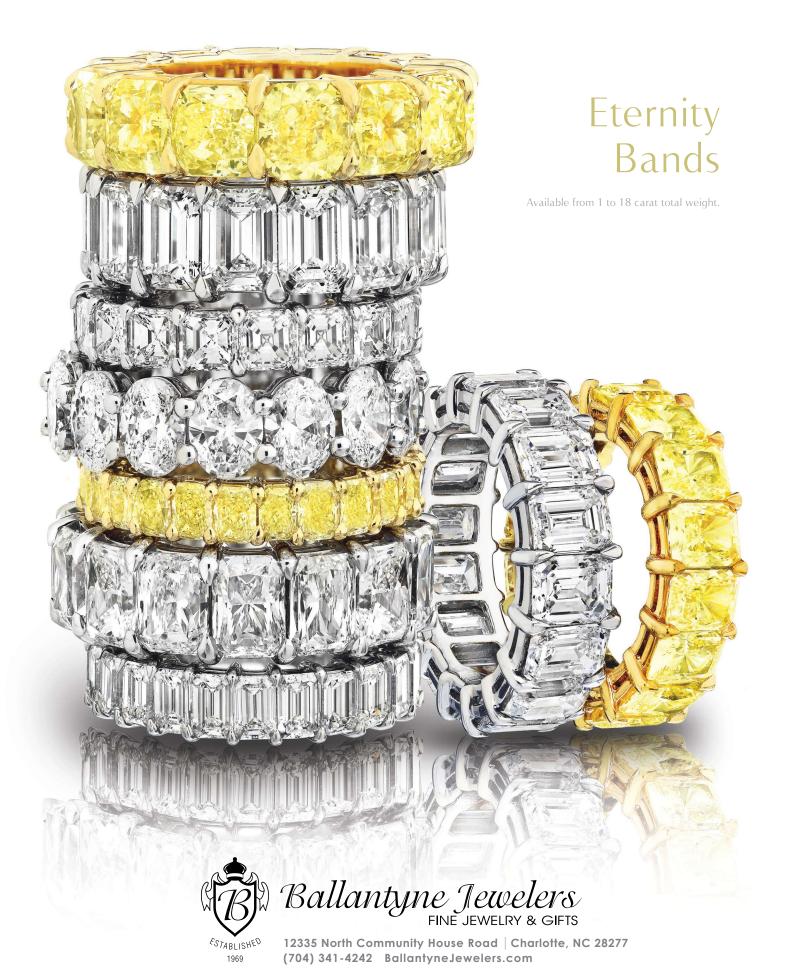

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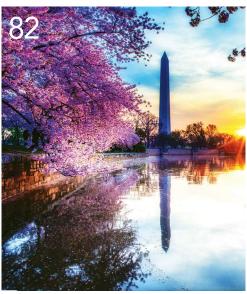

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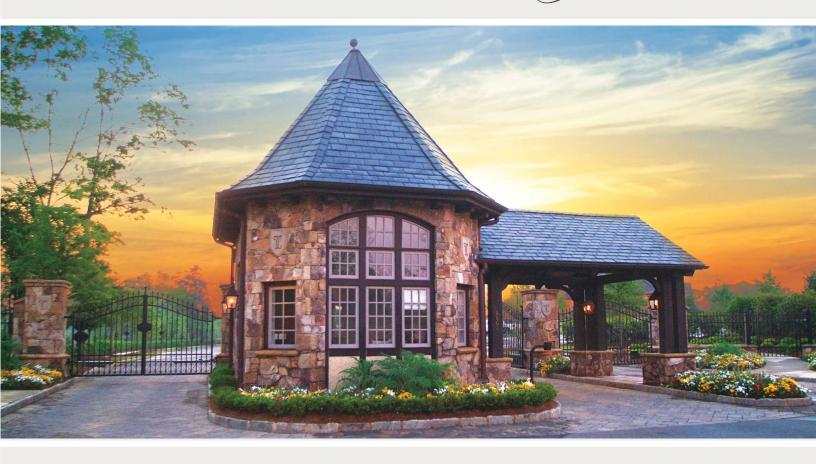

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# Gallery Offers Art by the Beatles, Dylan

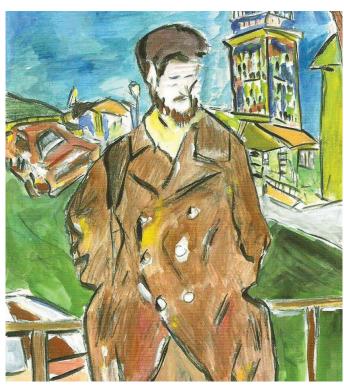

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# HOW DOES HER GARDEN GROW?

WITH
PATIENCE,

MASTER GARDENER SUSAN
LIPSEY is the quintessential
picture of the modern Southern
gardener. She is a healthconscious, sustainable-living
advocate with an eye
for aesthetics in both her
garden and home. She
also has a generous and
giving spirit.

Her abundant

garden in Providence
Downs is well planned
and designed but
uncomplicated and
changeable. "Gardening
is an experiment,"
Lipsey says. "If you try
something and it doesn't
work, you can replace
it with something else."
Her method for tracking



what works and what doesn't is as uncomplicated as her garden. She keeps a large three-ring binder filled with tags, taped to the pages, of plants, flowers and vegetables she grows. She makes notes next to each tag about when the item was planted and how it fared in her garden. A lifelong gardener, she earned the designation of master gardener in 2011 through the **Extension Master Gardeners** of Union County. To earn the designation, participants complete 10 classes on a range of gardening topics and pass a final exam.

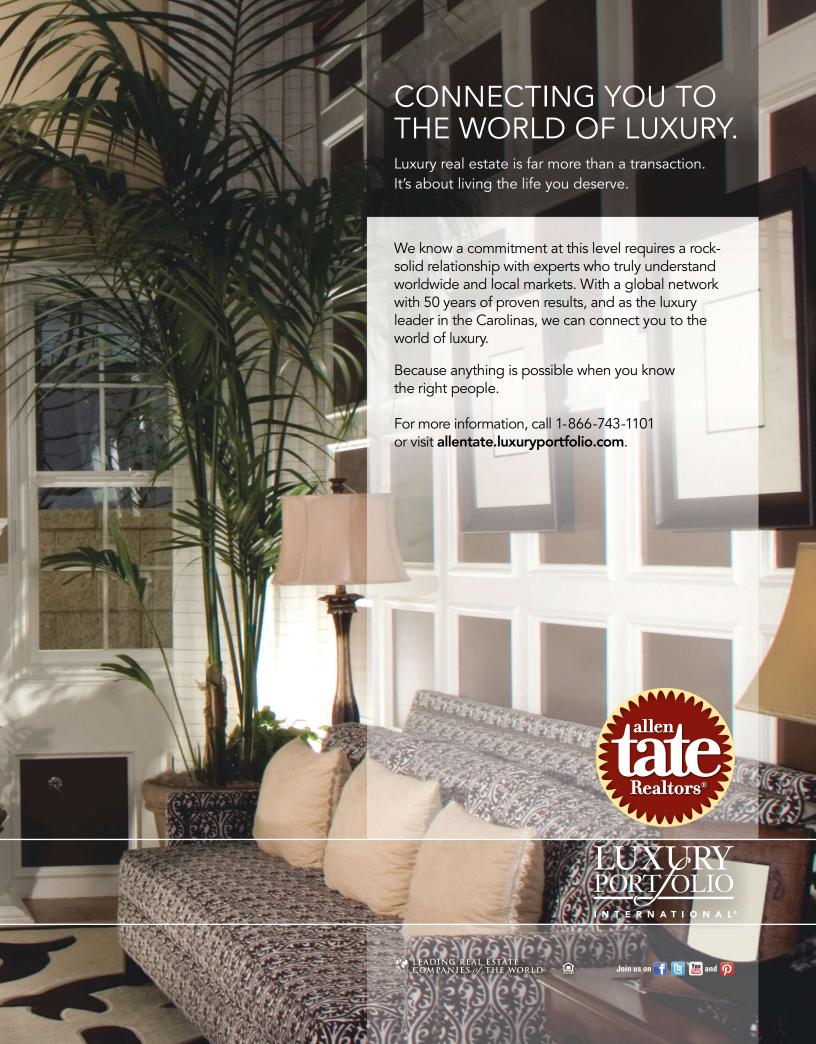
In her garden, she easily mixes flowers, shrubs, vegetable plants and herbs in raised beds and wooded areas of her backyard. Her flower gardens include ginger lilies, zinnias, oakleaf hydrangeas, coneflowers, Shasta daisies, lantana, drift roses, morning glories, Russian sage, wisteria, pineapple lilies, sunflowers, creeping jasmine and black-eyed Susans, interspersed with herbs such as tarragon, oregano, thyme, sage and basil.

She grows vegetables such as green beans, butternut squash, okra and fennel in raised beds, which reside near beds of strawberries and several blueberry and blackberry bushes.

Last spring, she grew tomato plants indoors from seed, which involved planting organic seeds in a seed-starting mix and placing them under fluorescent grow lights to maintain a consistent temperature of 75 to 85 degrees. Seeds need 12 hours of light per day to germinate. "The main

reason for growing tomatoes from seed is to guarantee the plants are non-GMO heirloom," says Lipsey. Her resulting tomato plants became a focal point of her 2015 garden.

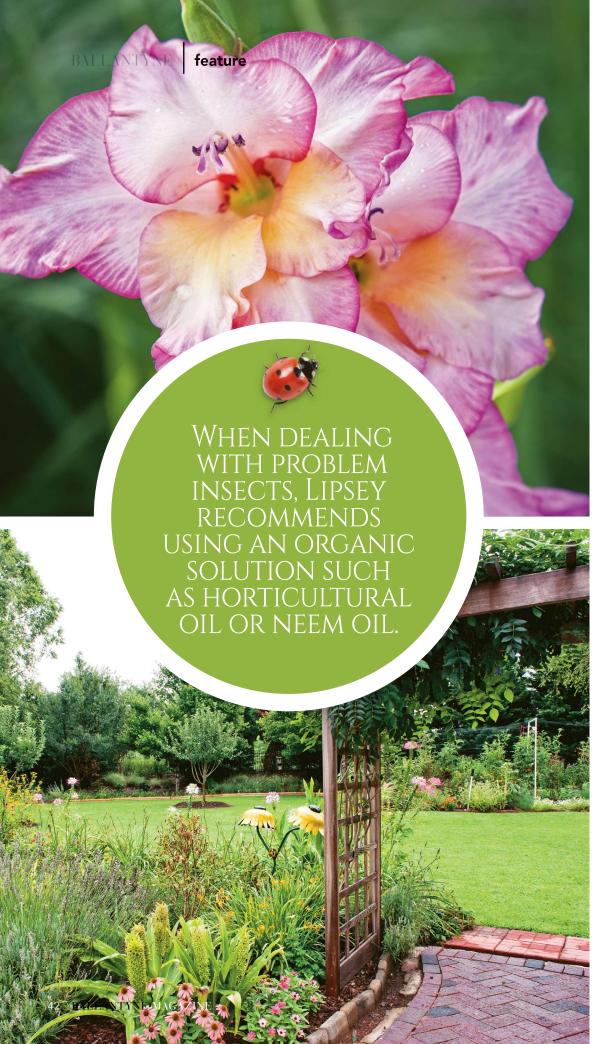
#### Sharing the Dirt on Soil

Nutrient-rich soil is the foundation for a beautiful garden. Lipsey improves her soil through vermicomposting using red wiggler worms, which break down food scraps and create microorganisms beneficial to the soil. An alternative is to make vermi tea from the worm castings and spray it on plants for natural protection against plant diseases. On top of her garden's healthy compost layers, she prefers mulch, mainly because it retains moisture better than pine straw.

Another natural, chemicalfree and inexpensive method Lipsey prefers for building her garden is called "lasagna gardening." The name refers not to the pasta but to layering organic materials that will be absorbed over time, resulting in rich soil that helps plants thrive.

Lasagna gardening creates new beds through several simple steps, Lipsey says. First, take cardboard, remove all the tape and break it down to flat pieces. Then cover the new bedding area with a layer of cardboard, making sure to overlap grass or weed areas so nothing can grow. Cover the cardboard with a three-inch layer of compost, and then cover the compost layer with wood mulch. The bed will need to lie dormant for





at least six months before planting. This allows time for the worms and beneficial insects to come and help kill the grass and weed areas and decompose the cardboard.

#### Weed, Pest Control

The majority of the time, Lipsey's garden thrives because she plants droughttolerant flowers, shrubs and vegetables native to the South. Even her praying mantises, which are a safe alternative to pesticides for controlling insects and bugs, are native to the area. "You want to look for the brown Carolina praying mantis," she says. "The green ones are from Asia and are not native. Why introduce something foreign into your garden?" When dealing with problem insects, Lipsey recommends using an organic solution such as horticultural oil or neem oil. Both can be purchased online, at garden stores and are safe for bee pollinators.

For killing weeds, she suggests two alternatives to chemicals. For the first, combine one gallon of vinegar with one ounce of dish soap in a spray bottle. Generously spray weeds in the garden, but only when the forecast calls for two consecutive days of sunshine. A second method, using baking soda, is mainly used for eliminating weeds in sidewalks and pavement areas. Simply take the powdered baking soda and sweep it into cracks and pavement spaces.

#### **Giving Nature**

Lipsey's lifelong interest in plants began when she was a little girl, gardening next to her mother. "My mom is now almost 80 and is still a big gardener," Lipsey says. "She has 48 tomato plants and shares her tomatoes with friends and family."

That sense of sharing and community is big in Lipsey's family. Both her mom and one of her sons are avid gardeners, and they all offer vegetables and cuttings to everyone they know. It's rare, however, that Lipsey cuts flowers to bring indoors. "I think it's mainly because I have so many windows viewing my outdoor gardens that I feel like the garden is already inside with us. It's better than a painting!"

Her generous nature extends beyond the garden to her work as a guardian ad litem, a volunteer advocate appointed by the court to support the rights and best interests of a child involved in a court proceeding. Lipsey would like to see others volunteer as well. More than 150 children in Mecklenburg County are in need of a guardian ad litem, she says.

Perhaps her philosophy of life can be best summed up in a quote from alternative medicine guru Deepak Chopra that serves as a tagline on her emails: "If we share with caring, lightheartedness and love, we will create abundance and joy for each other. And then this moment will have been worthwhile." 🗓

### Eating with Gusto!

Pasta and Tapas Restaurant Serves Fresh, Flavorful Food

IT'S NO SECRET THAT TAPAS ARE TRENDY RIGHT NOW. These small plates of Spanish meats, cheeses and vegetables are especially popular with cosmopolitan diners in urban settings. But area residents might not yet know that Gusto is taking that citified experience and re-creating it in the suburbs of Ballantyne.

The restaurant combines a casual environment and modern decor with fresh and flavorful food.
Rather than mimicking the heavy menu and lengthy pace of formal "white tablecloth" dining, Gusto focuses on fast service times that appeal to families, business people and others on the go.

There's lots of activity: cooks bustle in the open kitchen next to a section of counter seating where guests can watch the action; chefs prepare dough in an alcove with a picture window; the Wood Stone oven crackles as it bakes handmade pizzas and calzones.

#### **Eclectic Menu**

Chef Gonzalo Lopez is well known for his work in fine-dining restaurants around Charlotte. He oversees the evolving and eclectic menu. Most any kind of pasta imaginable can be created: beet, zucchini and squid ink are just a few varieties from a rainbow of choices made in-house. Tapas can be endlessly crafted to suit most palates, even particular ones.

Salads range from old-school Caesar to creative combinations of baby kale and beets or a quinoa tabbouleh that's gluten free. (Plenty of items are vegetarian or gluten free; each is marked on the menu. There's a kids' menu, too.) Best of all, adventurous diners won't feel

limited, and less daring guests won't feel overwhelmed.

Sangria drinkers can take their glasses embellished with the Gusto name home as a souvenir of the fun. General Manager Anthony Garcia won't divulge the exact recipes he devised for the restaurant's signature blends because they're a long-standing family tradition. But he reveals that the mainstay begins with a base of sweet Spanish wine, which is then enhanced with brandy, triple sec, orange juice, cinnamon and other citrus flavors. Weekend brunches feature a Bloody Mary and mimosa bar, along with live music for a jazzy experience.

#### **Comfortable Space**

At 4,500 square feet, Gusto occupies a large space, but it feels comfortable, not cavernous. It's smartly arranged with three private rooms that can be configured for book clubs, corporate meetings up to 100 attendees, private parties — even an indulgent, leisurely dinner on a special occasion. The restaurant's patio is small and cozy.

Owners Kristian and Carolyn Kellogg brought their sensibilities as self-proclaimed "impeccable foodies" to the restaurant (Kris confesses that as a perfectionist, what he does best is personify the "annoying customer who wants everything in their experience.") Construction started on the space, which didn't even have plumbing, in spring 2015, and the restaurant opened in October.

Gusto has deliciously taken the "uptown" experience and brought it "downtown" to this enclave south of the city center. And that won't stay a secret for long.

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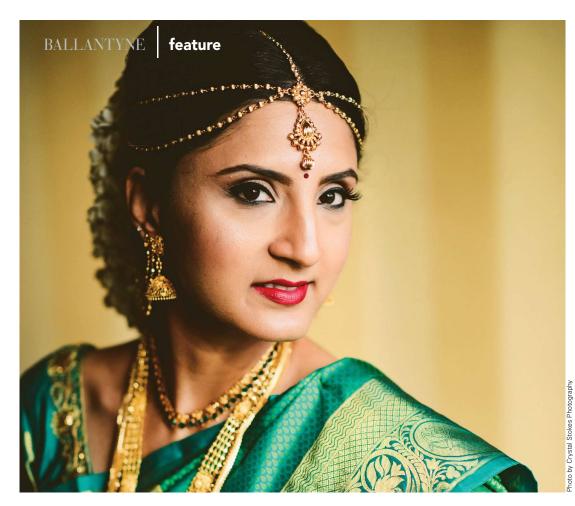

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## Inspirational Legacy

#### Elon Name in Ballantyne Long Tied to Helping Children

#### By Nan Bauroth

BALLANTYNE DATES ITS FORMAL ROOTS as a community to the 1990s, but the area was long home to others, including youngsters in desperate straits who were provided a safe haven at Elon Homes for Children. It once occupied the 120-acre site that is now home to Elon Park Elementary School and Elon Park.

The little-known story of how the children's home came to be built here began in 1961 when Fred Johnson Kennedy Jr., an intrepid social worker and counselor in the Mecklenburg County juvenile court system, saw many boys in such terrible plights that they had to be removed from their homes.

Convinced state correctional facilities only made their situations worse, Kennedy determined to build a residential unit where these youngsters could put their lives back together in a secure, nurturing setting.

To achieve his dream, Kennedy assembled Charlotte philanthropists and community leaders to raise funds. Notables included Jim Babb, then CEO and president of Jefferson-Pilot Communications; business consultant Ty "My father wanted a stable environment where these boys could live and grow up."

business consultant Ty
Boyd; Charlotte Observer columnist Kays Gary; and attorney
Gaston H. Gage. Thanks to their efforts and the generosity of
others, in 1970 Kennedy opened the first cottage of a haven
he named Boys Town.

#### **Stable Environment**

"My father wanted a stable environment where these boys could live and grow up," says David Kennedy, who now serves on the Board of Governors of Elon Homes and Schools for Children. He recalls living with eight of the boys in that first cottage during the summer of 1971 when he was only five years old and his father was searching for foster parents for Boys Town. "The cottage was way off Ardrey Kell Road," he recalls.

Sadly, Fred Kennedy never lived to see his full dream come true, passing away in the early 1970s at only 39. "The day slated for the groundbreaking of a gymnasium at Boys Town ended up being the day of his funeral," Kennedy says.

In 1985 The Duke Endowment helped Boys Town merge

with Elon Homes for Children, established in 1905 by the Southern Convention of Christian Churches at Elon College, located just west of Burlington, N.C. Boys Town became the Kennedy Campus of the larger organization, and in 1987 the first girls were admitted. In 1995, a privately licensed school was created on the grounds to meet the children's specific needs.

#### **Selling the Land**

Three years later, the school and Elon Homes moved to Sharon Road West. "We owe much to Gaston Gage," says Jane



Grosse, vice president of institutional advancement for the nonprofit. "He negotiated the purchase of the (Ballantynearea) acreage for \$140,000 and then sold it for \$9 million, providing us with significant funds."

Today, Elon Homes and Schools for Children — which has transitioned to one of the largest and most respected resources for foster care of children who are in Department of Social Services custody — is entirely located on the campus of Johnson C. Smith University in west Charlotte.

"I love telling my father's story," Kennedy says, noting that his mother, Gail Kennedy, is still involved with the organization. "Dad gave those boys the chance to be like other kids, to give them hope for a brighter future."

audience. Yet, both artists say it's been local connections that have jump-started their businesses and helped them grow.

#### 'Festival was Key'

Downing, 45, has enjoyed woodworking since he was 15 years old. He started making gifts for family and friends. Five years ago, he incorporated and created MiDo Creations. He focused at first on building a website and securing lumber. Downing's biggest worry was when the site

went live he wouldn't be able to keep up with orders coming in. But nothing happened.

"I was like, 'Uh-oh. How do I market this?" says Downing, who works full time for Bank of America in business development in the small business department. He tried Google ads, Etsy and consignment stores, which were too expensive, he says. Then he showed his pieces at Waxhaw's Autumn Treasures arts and crafts festival.

"That was perfect," he recalls. "I was able to show my work and meet and talk with people about woodworking and taking care of the cutting boards. I love that."

Downing got his first custom order at the festival from a former manager of Vine American Kitchen. He commissioned 50 custom boards to use with flatbread pizzas. Downing now regularly attends the fall show and the Waxhaw Art Kaleidoscope festival in the spring.

"The festival was key. It kept me busy enough and it justified why I was doing (the business)," he says.

Business strategists agree that community connections can be a big advantage for small businesses. Shoppers feel good supporting local artisans and like talking with artists and developing a more intimate connection with the piece being bought.

Real estate agent Cheri Ritter uses Downing's pieces as housewarming gifts, proud they are made locally and customized to each client's kitchen.

Ritter, who lives in Waxhaw and works out of the Allen Tate Co.'s Ballantyne office, knew Downing through their children. When she started



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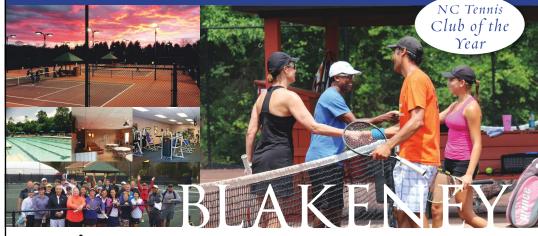

selling real estate two years ago, she wanted a unique gift to give clients and thought of Downing's cutting boards. They now have an arrangement where Ritter tells Downing the kitchen's color scheme and he uses his artistry to pick complimentary woods, patterns and grains. Ritter presents the board to her client with a locally baked Bundt cake.

"You can tell the time he puts into it. It's a quality piece of art," Ritter says. "I point out that this was

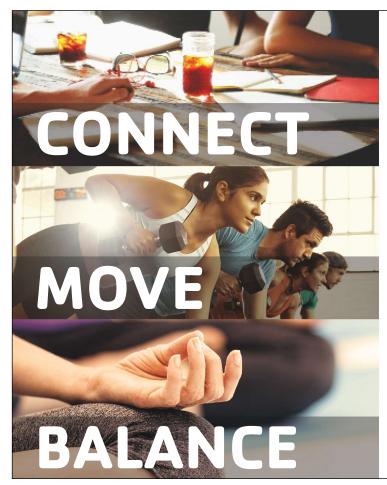
#### **Boutiques Spur Necklace Maker**

Hall's jewelry design business, Hands High Designs, grew out of her interest in fabric remnants from a home redecorating project and has thrived thanks to interest from friends and local boutiques. A horse enthusiast, Hall named her business after the unit of measure for horses.

A former teacher and a mom of three children, Hall, 35, has always loved fashion. Born and raised in New York, her first job was working as an assistant to a Fortune 500 CEO who was married to a supermodel. Hall later lived in Arizona and fell in love with the natural, boho vibe. She and her husband, John, moved

to Ballantyne about nine years ago.

Hall was redecorating her home last year when she felt a connection with the fabrics. She woke up in the middle of the night with a vision for how she might use them and put together a necklace using a grey, cream and black tribal print. She wore that first necklace around town and received a stream of compliments. This led to a friend hosting a trunk show so she could showcase her necklaces, which are

bands of fabric adorned with objects such as bone, shells, antlers and recycled glass.

Inspired by positive feedback, Hall started posting on social media. She received orders, but it became timeconsuming managing feeds, messages and orders. She now uses her website as the central contact point.

Her biggest confidence boost, however, came from the local attention. Walking into shops with her daughters, owners would ask about the jewelry they were wearing (Hall also designs a line of necklaces for children, Little Bits). Her jewelry is now carried in at least five local boutiques, a number expected to grow.

"I feel like it's been organic growth," Hall says. "I walked into a store with my girlfriend, and a girl happened to be a buyer and she said, 'I love your necklace.' We met a couple days later, and they bought a bunch on the spot. From there I felt like, 'OK, the ball is rolling."

Another valuable relationship started online but it soon became clear it was a local connection. Charlotte-based interior designer Lauren Nicole and her assistant were arranging and posting photos of fall vignettes on Instagram

and noticed a comment from Hands High Designs.

Nicole didn't realize it at first, but something about it made her think she knew the poster personally. Turned out the two have children in the same school and live within five miles of one another. After getting to know one another more, they saw that Nicole's interest in design connected well with Hall's interest in jewelry.

Earlier this year, Hall visited Nicole at her Ballantyne-area retail shop, Lauren Nicole Home. Hall pulled out some of her necklace designs. Some featured a gray and yellow plaid fabric, which perfectly matched the store's new tablescape, a springy end-of-winter scene with cream napkins and linens with gray and yellow accents. The store now carries Hall's necklaces.

"This really fits in so nicely and we love supporting local artisans," Nicole says. "I really believe in (Hall) and her product line."



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# Cultivating Creativity

### Discover the Artist Within

YOU KNOW THAT ONE PERSON AT THE GYM WHO MAKES YOU THINK, "I really want to look like that!"

Yet, you never hear someone say, "I'll never look like that, I'm not talented enough."

So, why would you look at a painting and think you're not creative enough to do something similar because of "talent"? We are constantly interpreting the visual world. We even make up pictures in our brains while we're sleeping because we just can't get enough of it! Each of us has the visual understanding needed to create art. What some of us need is a process that allows us to explore our creativity freely.

#### **Self-Kindness**

Since the idea of "natural talent" is silly, the first thing you should do to explore your creativity is to be gentle with yourself. If you think too much about your goals, you will become less natural in your process. If you are honest with your process, you won't have time to tell yourself your creation looks bad. If you are a human, being gentle with yourself will be a constant struggle, but you "officially" have permission to go easy on yourself while you are exploring

your creative mind — so, step one is to practice self-kindness.

Your second step is to choose a daily process for exploring your creativity. It is best to choose a process that allows you to be a keen observer of the world first and a creator of things second.

One example of a daily process is a sketch journal. It's a great way of paying more attention to what you are seeing rather than what you are creating. No one else will see your journal so you can go nuts! Just record what you see and have fun; make pictures you love and drawings your motherin-law won't approve of. Just be sure that you are paying more attention to the visual source than you are the final outcome. And remember, since it's a process, consistency is key. Don't get too busy with the real life of kids and/ or the dog so as to skip your daily sketch journal.

Finally, remember the person you were admiring at the gym? You saw them there because being in a community of like-minded people helps us develop the drive to "keep at it."

Workshops, classes and drawing groups are all fantastic ways to further our creative insight while mixing things up. Don't be shy about being a beginner in a group of artists; we all start somewhere and you'll benefit from everyone else's years of practice and mistakes just by being around them.

No matter the person you are or what kind of experience you have, you can use visual

art to explore your creativity. Just remember to be gentle with yourself and your expectations, find a process you love and embrace it, and seek out a community to provide you with support. Now, get out there and make some art. If your search is authentic, your images will be too.

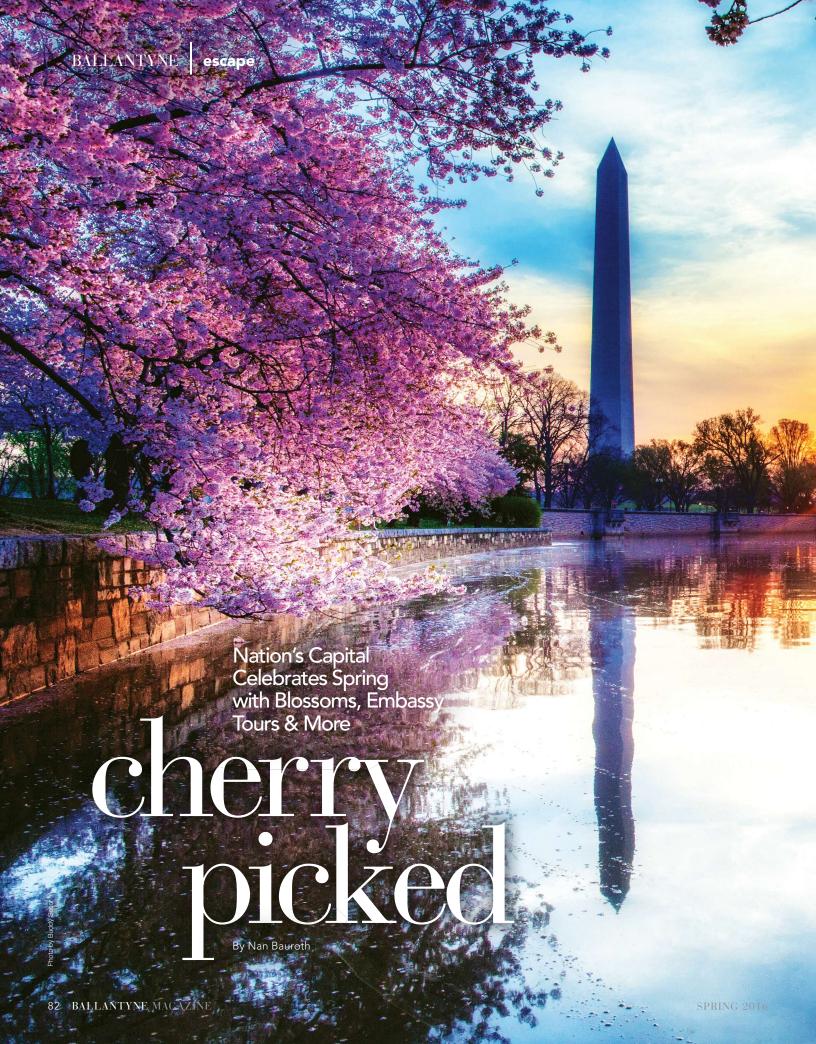

first president also would be humbled that this city named in his honor serves not only as the federal seat of government but a perennial draw for citizens enjoying its wealth of distinctly American museums, galleries and monuments.

An ideal time to capture Washington, D.C.'s essence is during the National Cherry Blossom Festival, which creates a spectacular backdrop for the mall and nearby area. This year's festival runs from March 20 to April 17. Average peak bloom is April 4, but blossoms last 14 days so there's a good window of time to catch the show.

You can immerse yourself in the fluttering pink froth by walking, taking the National Mall Circulator bus or riding a bike (rent from Capital Bikeshare or popular Bike and Roll DC, which also offers tours). For a festival route map and peek at the

www.nationalblossomfestival.org. In 1912, the mayor of Tokyo gave Washington 3,000 cherry trees, some of which have died or are planted in spots other than the Tidal Basin. The festival celebrates the generous gift with events and activities. Beltway insiders especially savor cherry-themed afternoon tea in Peacock Alley at the historic Willard InterContinental, one of Washington's poshest places to stay and home to the Japanese delegation during its presentation of the trees.

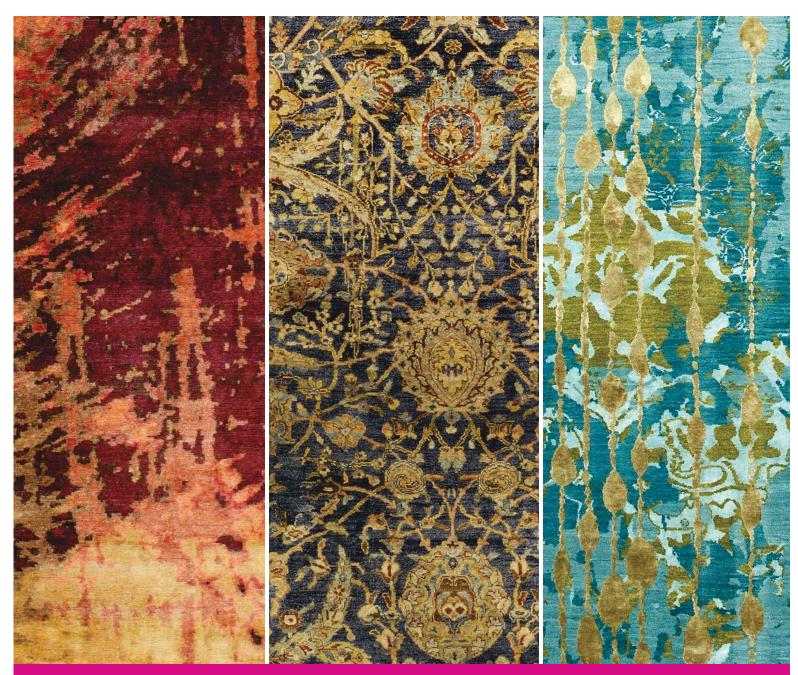

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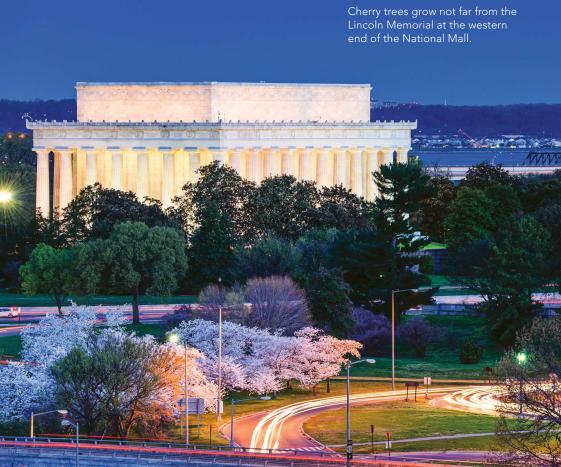

sent emissaries abroad seeking favor from foreign governments. Today, 180 embassies, consulates and diplomatic missions have a presence in the nation's capital. "Every foreign country wants to be here," says Steve Shulman, executive director of Cultural Tourism DC, a nonprofit that on May weekends stages Passport DC, a rare opportunity



for the public to get inside 70 or so embassies.

The event kicks off Saturday, May 7, with the "Around the World Embassy Tour," when 45 non-European countries open their doors from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. along Embassy Row and in International Court (another embassy neighborhood). "You can't have this experience anywhere else in the world," Shulman notes. "From the Philippines, you cross the street to Australia, then back to Peru. One year the Australian ambassador was cooking shrimp on the barbie for everyone." Lines can be long at larger embassies, but countries often entertain people out front with music and dance.

Saturday, May 14, brings "A Shortcut to Europe," with 28 countries in the European Union (EU) inviting the public inside. Belgium samples its chocolates, Ireland its beer and the United Kingdom its tea. Saturday, May 21, is Fiesta Asia sponsored by embassies in that region of the world, and the final weekend features the Embassy Chef Challenge.

While in the area, you can dine at 100 restaurants within 10 blocks, including B Too, a contemporary Belgian eatery run by the former official chef of the EU, who offers a wonderful children's menu.

#### **Monuments**

The National Mall is resplendent with monuments memorializing beloved presidents and patriots. Kate Gibbs, media relations director for Destination DC, suggests visitors consider different times of day to experience them. "Monuments are staffed by park rangers up to 9 p.m.," she says. "You could see some monuments



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during the day, then return to see others illuminated with the cherry trees in the moonlight."

For lunch nearby, she recommends Paul, a large French patisserie that sells delicious salads and baguette sandwiches and has plentiful seating for families. Teens often prefer the funky food mall at Union Market. 701, across from the National Mall at 701 Pennsylvania Ave., offers adults a sophisticated lunch deal at the bar.

Another must stop is Arlington Cemetery, where you can catch the moving ceremony of the Changing of the Guard at

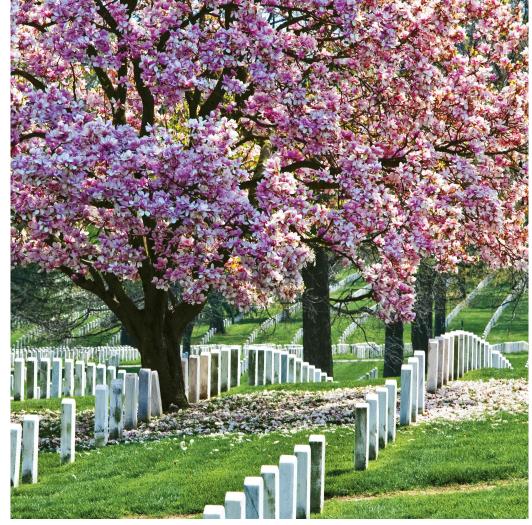

the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier every hour, and then walk or take a bus tour through beautifully kept graves of fallen heroes.

### **Museum Madness**

Even if you've been to Washington's major museums, there are always fabulous new exhibits. This spring the National Air and Space Museum launches "A New Moon Rises" with stunning photos from the Lunar Reconnaissance Orbiter Camera. For a high-flying sugar fix during your visit, order freeze-dried astronaut ice cream.

For an intriguing conclusion to your capital adventure, surveil the International Spy Museum, delving into America's espionage tradecraft dating to 1776. View the "Exquisitely Evil: 50 Years of Bond Villains" exhibit, and blow your last dollars on ingenious souvenirs like Wi-Fi cuff links with a secret flash drive for hiding classified intel. Bond would be proud.

### Getting There and Around

If you drive into Washington, D.C., parking usually costs \$50 per night. Instead, Gibbs suggests putting your car in long-term parking at Reagan National Airport, then catching the Metro to your hotel. Luxe accommodations include the Willard InterContinental and the uber modern Mandarin Oriental. Families on a budget like Kimpton's 11 boutique hotels, including the Madera and Rouge with bunk beds that fit four into one suite.

### TICKETS TO THE CAPITOL, WHITE HOUSE

Free tickets for the U.S. Capitol tour are available through N.C. Congressman Robert Pittenger's Washington office (202-225-1976), where staffers take groups of 15 or fewer, helping you avoid the general lines. For free tickets to White House tours, you must call at least 21 days ahead, but it's advisable to request tickets up to five months in advance.

Since White House tours can be canceled on a moment's notice, Destination DC's Katie Gibbs suggests visiting the White House Visitor Center for a touchscreen tour and then shopping at the White House Historical Association Gift Shop for an unusual memento, such as a letter opener with a saber designed for George Washington or White House Christmas ornaments.

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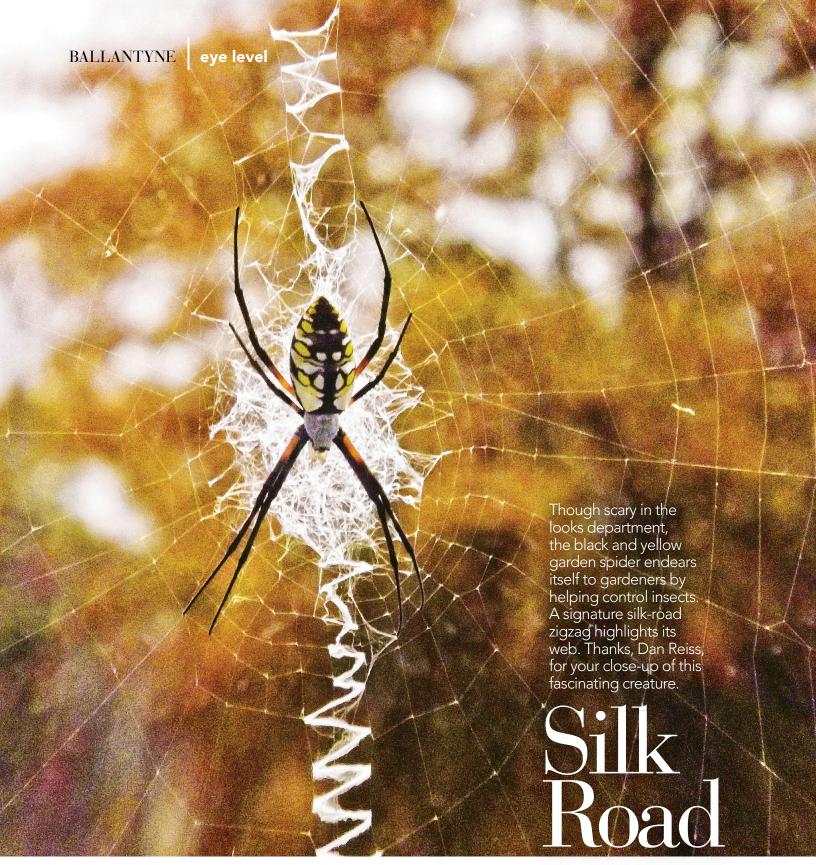
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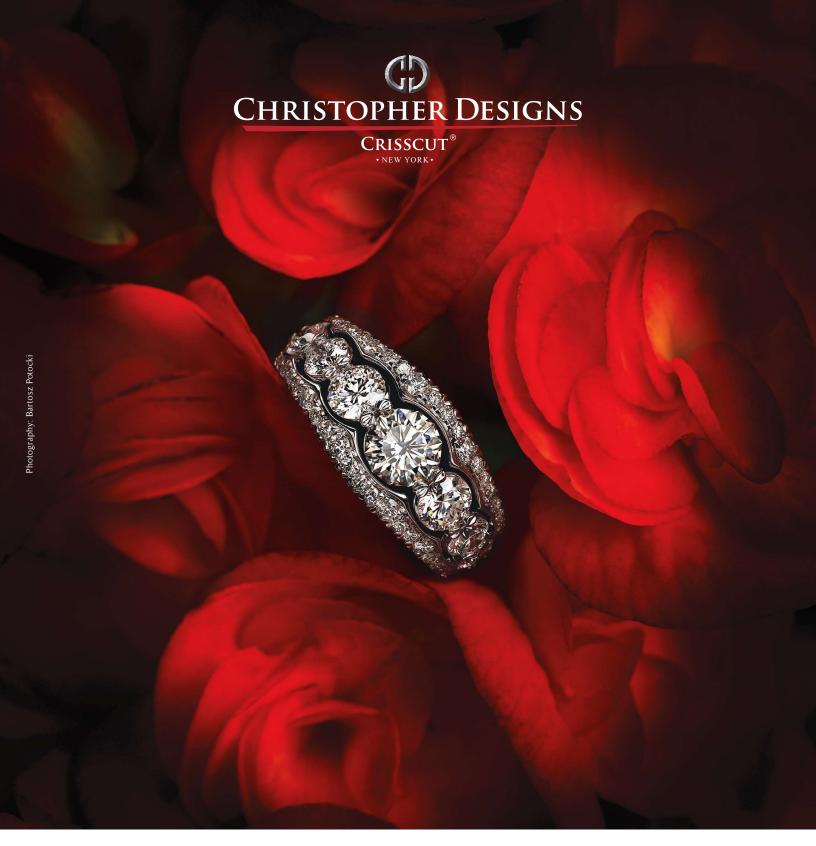
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
