

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
Corporate Park Hosts Food Drive

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

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Let's Vase It

Tips from a Pro Make Creating Beautiful Arrangements Easy

SUMMER IS HERE AND EVERYWHERE YOU LOOK GORGEOUS flowers are in bloom. Each day, new blossoms catch my eye and remind me of the beauty surrounding me. My love affair with flowers began when I was 12 years old and has been with me ever since. Entering a garden club flower show was the beginning of my career as a florist, and now, 30 years later, arranging flowers is still a labor of love.

Fresh flowers brighten any room, but not all of us have a natural gift for arranging them. Creating flower arrangements can be frustrating if you lack the gift, but here are a few tips that can help everyone.

The Right Container

The first thing is to find the right container. Most of us have vases or other vessels sitting around the house that will work — like Mason jars, julep cups, pitchers or even old bottles. The secret to finding the right one is the opening of the container. A perfect vase is one with a cinched-in mouth, so your flowers do not fall out or flop.

Carnations are back in vogue, and they come in vibrant colors, cost less than many other varieties and last a long time.

If you like the aesthetics of square, rectangle or cylinder vases, they will work just as well with a large bouquet or by using a florist's technique of "gridding it off." That means using tape to create a grid at the opening of the vase, a step that will keep your flowers upright and in your preferred arrangement. This can be done best with clear florist tape, but Scotch tape will work if you are careful not to get it wet.

Choosing your flowers is the fun part! Your local florist or even grocery store should have a good selection, and some of us are lucky to have yards to gather flowers from hydrangeas, Lenten roses, sedum, roses and forsythia to make quick, beautiful arrangements. You can put together a simple arrangement by using just one variety of flowers (such as roses or carnations) and mounding them on the top of the vase. Carnations are back in vogue, and they come in vibrant colors, cost less than many other varieties and last a long time.



Want Texture?


If you want to assemble a mixed arrangement, choose several kinds of flowers to add texture. Select colors that complement each other, and use something tall and spiky like snapdragons, Bells of Ireland or the stock flower, which mix well with round flowers like gerberas, ranunculuses (commonly known as buttercups) and roses.

Your color palette is a matter of taste. I love bright hues of pink, purple and orange, but white and greens can be just as interesting if you find the right texture combination. Greenery is optional; I never incorporate it into my vase arrangements. I suggest staying away from filler flowers like baby's breath and Monte Casino asters. Although baby's breath by itself in a vase can be pretty, let your flowers make their own statement.


Always change out your water every few days. Your flowers should be conditioned before you purchase them so it is really not necessary to add anything else to the water. Just have fun, and remember that beauty is truly in the eye of the beholder.

Dominick Thompson, project manager for Andrew Roby, a Charlotte custom residential contractor currently managing several major home renovations in Ballantyne Country Club, says his company's clients are seeking this same sense of connection. "The big thing right now is owners wishing to incorporate the kitchen, living room and their nice outdoor space into one viewing area."

In his experience, when a home is segmented into many rooms and people cannot see everyone, they feel as if they are not interacting with friends or families. "But if you are in the kitchen cooking and can look across the living room and talk to a friend, or turn a little the other way and look through the patio doors to where others are congregating, it makes you feel totally engaged," he observes.

'Just Fire and Water'

In the case of the Longview couple, the two had built their dream home in the Midwest only to be uprooted here for a career move. After touring 57 homes that didn't match their wish list, they instantly knew the Longview house possessed good bones and their desired location — on a golf course and in a gated, guardhouse community. But the backyard

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

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
was not finished, so their first mission was to redesign the exterior living space.

The plan they ultimately implemented was inspired by a trip to a resort in Cabo, Mexico, where the couple was enthralled by the outdoor walkways and common areas lit entirely by natural firelight. "We wanted that look for our own backyard — no artificial lighting. Just fire and water."

They extended the existing covered patio via a pergola that leads to a more spacious patio seating and entertaining area in the backyard, where

a fountain flanked by two fire bowls serves as the main focal point. To complete the resort feel, a two-sided fireplace lights a sunken hot tub on one side and group seating on the other.

Linking to the Outside

Once the couple completed the backyard, they realized they could not easily see or access it from the interior because the living room wall facing the backyard only had three small windows and a standard door leading to the patio. The kitchen was also blocked off from the family room by a massive wall.

The solution was to install floor-to-ceiling sliding glass doors in the living room, creating a continual transition between the interior and exterior and a flood of natural light.

To provide an even greater sense of openness, they removed the wall between the kitchen and living room — no small feat given it was load-bearing, with one side containing the stove and kitchen cabinets. The owners' inventive concept was to retain the stove, surrounding it with a striking countertop fashioned of mirrorimage granite slabs studded with quartzite.

The original kitchen island with its beautiful walnut countertop, which the owners loved, was also retained. To address storage, cabinets around the stove were repurposed into a new butlery on one side of the kitchen desk, a space that had not been fully utilized. The other side of this space was converted into one of the

The change in the home's look and feel is dramatic. "Now we have an elegant inside and outside," one

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

doors and just enjoy the upper-level patio or remotely raise the floor-toceiling, upper-patio screens and be fully extended into the backyard."



Renovation Tips

Thompson of Andrew Roby advises that the trend to remake space often involves knocking down walls, so expertise in this area of construction is critical. "We've done some pretty technically challenging wall removals where wood or steel I-beams are being put in. Sometimes we are talking about a 20-foot span supporting a second story, which is a really big wall opening."

The challenge is working with a good architect or designer, engineer and builder to understand exactly what needs to be executed before doing anything, he says. "The guidance and creativity they offer will prevent problems and the investment will pay for itself."







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


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


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



TIPS: **TIMING** AND BAIT

Fish tend to bite most during the first three hours of daylight and the last two to three hours of daylight.

Bream and catfish are the easiest to catch. For bream, attach a cork or bobber to your line, a small hook and anything edible, such as bread or cheese. Catfish swim on the bottom and will eat almost anything. Suggested baits include shrimp, chicken livers or anything doughy rolled into a ball.



Urban Gems

Sometimes a favorite fishing hole is nestled in a seemingly unexpected spot.

In south Charlotte, Ballantyne Corporate Park is home to more

The state stocks some ponds for free. Sometimes, fish find their way in naturally, either through water birds who bring in fish eggs stuck on their feet, or if a creek floods and fish or fish eggs end up in a nearby lake.

Ponds at Ballantyne Corporate Park are stocked with hybrid striped bass, largemouth bass, minnows, shellcrackers and bluegill. Grass carp aren't for fishing; they are there to eat algae.

than 300 companies, including Fortune 500 headquarters. But local residents also include bass, bluegill and shellcrackers swimming in the ponds in the pocket parks. Grass carp live there too, grazing on the algae.

Near the 17th hole of The Golf Club at Ballantyne's course, you can find a pond complete with a fishing dock and fish food. Cullman Park features patio tables with chairs and umbrellas, a peaceful waterfall and a charming bridge. At the aptly named Kid Pond, there's a boardwalk for fishing and three wooden benches conveniently located for anglers needing a break.

Mueller enjoys casting into these urban gems and favors the pond near the 17th hole. In the past, he's helped families bait their hooks and enjoyed watching them reel in bass and bluegill.

He advises parents to have patience during their time at the pond. He knows firsthand that a day of fishing can often turn into something





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else — such as a leisurely stroll around the water's edge or an intense discussion about the lifespan of a bug. When that happens, he puts down his pole to enjoy the moment.

"It's a relatively low-cost, easy and fun way to learn about nature," he says. "You learn about fish and bugs and talk about the weather. It's just a great experience."







Peruvian Panache

Viva Chicken Serves Dishes Inspired by Centuries-Old Cuisine

IMAGINE THE BEST CHICKEN YOU'VE EVER TASTED. Something Southern and fried probably comes to mind. But keep traveling south — another 3,000 miles or so to Peru — and you'll find a style of chicken cookery that just might change your mind.

Viva Chicken in Charlotte boasts mouthwatering Peruvian rotisserie chicken, prepared by a time-tested method and made nearly irresistible with authentically spiced side dishes.

Peru is a country of diverse geography that includes coastal, highland and jungle climes. Add to that a mix of cultural influences from Europe, Africa and Asia. The result is a centuries-old cuisine that experts predict will use its foothold as a modern trend

here in the U.S. to grow rapidly in popularity. If Viva Chicken is any measure, those experts are right.

'Gringo Killer'

By 6 each morning, prep cooks arrive to chop vegetables and make the sauces for lunch and dinner. The aji amarillo sauce is creamy and mild; the huacatay is spicier and contains Peruvian mint; and the rocoto pepper is affectionately dubbed the "gringo killer." The free-range chickens that have been marinated are slow-roasted in the rotisserie oven specially built in Peru.

The most-ordered menu item is pollo a la brasa, served as a quarter, half or whole chicken accompanied by dipping sauce and each diner's choices from a list

of 10 side dishes (four words of advice: try the canary beans.).

For lighter fare, a quinoa-stuffed avocado, made with organic grains, is both satisfying and guilt-free. Like the Inca Wrap, pastas and rice dishes, it's vegetarian. Classic saltado features stir-fried sirloin steak atop fries and rice with Peruvian soy sauce. There's plenty of ingredient flexibility on a menu that includes appetizers, salads, sandwiches and wraps.

Viva Chicken serves beer, wine and the Peruvian soda called Inca Cola. But the perfect summer beverages are traditional and vibrant in color: chicha morada, made from purple corn and spices; maracuya, a golden, passion-fruit punch; and sunny green lemonade with basil and mint. Uninitiated diners are encouraged to sample them.

Service is brisk as customers crowd into Viva Chicken, but this is emphatically not fast food.



Good Choices for Kids

Parents of picky kids will be happy to know Viva Chicken offers mainstays such as chicken tenders and green beans, although it's a safe bet kids will be willing to try colorful fried sweet potatoes or plantains. They'll want to leave room for dessert, especially alfajores. These are chewy, buttery Peruvian cookies sandwiched around a caramel dulce de leche filling and dusted with powdered sugar.


Randy Garcia is one of Viva Chicken's owners. He "grew up" at Villa Antonio, the eatery his parents owned on South Boulevard. Bruno Macchiavello was a chef at that restaurant, and the two men discussed opening their own place for a couple of years before moving forward with Dennis Thompson as a partner.

With a cozy location on Elizabeth Avenue near downtown Charlotte and this more expansive space opened locally in the Shops at Toringdon last November, Viva Chicken plans to open a third restaurant in Huntersville this summer.

Service is brisk as customers crowd into Viva Chicken, but this is emphatically not fast food. As families, shoppers and business people dine side by side, they may not know or care that the meal they're enjoying is fashionable. But they'll probably all agree that it could become their new favorite dish — "Southern" style.

Original Art, Local Galleries Attract Enthusiastic Local Support

IF LIFE IMITATES ART, IT'S NO SURPRISE THAT BALLANTYNE is rapidly making a name for itself as a hot new nexus in Charlotte for venues showcasing the best in creative expression. With a high degree of education and penchant for traveling to worldly destinations, many who live and work here possess a sophisticated artistic palate that eagerly welcomes outlets to indulge their appreciation for works that inspire the imagination.

Still, many here are not aware the arts scene in Ballantyne is thriving. Art in the Village, a social event begun in Ballantyne Village last fall, now attracts 100 art lovers a month, while Charlotte Fine Art Gallery in Carmel Village, owned by artist Joni Purk, is luring growing crowds with monthly exhibitions of noted artists from around the country, including a recent retrospective featuring pop art guru Peter Max.

Art in the Village

When Ed Camp became general manager of Ballantyne Village last year, he parlayed his two years as director of The ArtsCenter in Carrboro near Chapel Hill into Art in the Village, a reception on the fourth Friday of every month. Ballantyne residents who appreciate art can relax and spend an evening enjoying original works by 13 local artists who are there in person. Housed next to TCBY, the Art in the Village gallery displays 100 of their works, which are for sale.

"One of our hopes is to support local artists and show there is a vibrant art scene here in Ballantyne," Camp explains. "Artists are selling work, which is wonderful for them. We are getting repeat customers, surprised by the quality of art created here in Charlotte. We will always be committed to doing this kind of event in some shape or form at a space here because it fits our village atmosphere."

In March, Art in the Village saluted arts in education by showing works by students at the Northwest School of the Arts in Mecklenburg County, as well as a compilation of tiles individually designed by members of the Ballantyne Village Kids Club.

Charlotte Fine Art Gallery

When artist Joni Purk founded Charlotte Fine Art Gallery in 2011 at Carmel Village, it didn't take long before people driving by saw the sign and ventured inside.

She has since moved to larger space in Carmel Village to accommodate the crowded receptions for her monthly exhibits, which feature works in 2-D and 3-D media by

noteworthy American artists, as well as art classes, camps and workshops in the gallery's studio space. Carmel Village is located at the corner of Carmel Road and Highway 51.

"The response has been fantastic," Purk says. "This is now a large metro area with a diverse culture, so clients often purchase art that reminds them of a place they have lived or been before. Visitors to the gallery are drawn to everything from abstraction to photorealism and large works spanning three to four feet." Purk often helps them assemble a complement of artwork that could include two smaller paintings and a piece of sculpture.

In addition to managing the shows, Purk still paints (her work was the featured exhibit in May) and teaches as well. "The best part for me is the thrill of holding these special exhibits and meeting the artists. And I absolutely love to teach," she adds. "It's wonderful when it clicks with a beginning artist, and they are so proud of finishing a piece. There's nothing more rewarding than watching people develop their understanding and appreciation of art."

These artists are among the ones who show work at Art in the Village.

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



Cyclists, runners and walkers have their pick of 30 miles of trails and 10 miles of expansive dunes or a guided historical sunset or wetland wildlife ride. Families can join a butterfly, Kiawah creature or night beach walk or take lessons together in cast netting, seining and birding. Fishing charters and cruises of every kind also abound.

July Fourth weekend, Kiawah celebrates with two firework shows, and in September, the island hosts an annual triathlon that is an intermediate distance competition sanctioned by the USA Triathlon Association.

Nonstop Golf

With five top-notch courses, Kiawah is a golfer's dream. The spectacular Ocean Course, named by Golf Digest as America's toughest course, dares players with a mindnumbing 7,873 yards from the extreme back tees.

Turtle Point, a Jack Nicklaus course, is best known for its challenging 412-yard 15th hole and its 24,000-square-foot teaching facility.

Popular for scenery and tough holes, Osprey Point underwent restoration by designer Tom Fazio in 2014, including conversion to paspalum, the salt-tolerant grass praised by tournament players. Cougar Point by Gary Player boasts a three-hole stretch on the front nine with panoramic views of the Kiawah River and marsh birdlife. (Oak Point, Kiawah's fifth golf course, is currently closed for renovation.)
