wo photographers and I recently visited several Ballantyne restaurants and bars for our feature story "Unwind and Enjoy: 5 Nightlife Spots to Check Out in 28277." Fresh Twist

Eatery Serves Up Creative Salads, Grain Bowls, Wraps

ere's a tasty question to mull over: Can you name a restaurant you'll find at the Empire State Building, in Times Square, a few steps from the White House — and in Charlotte's Blakeney shopping center?

Give up? It's Chopt, which bills itself as a "creative salad company" and has a modern, urban vibe. It's new to our region in the last two years, but with its fast and fresh offerings, it's quickly winning fans.

Steamy summer days call for cooler fare, and Chopt can create countless combos of salads, wraps and grain bowls. Yet, with more than 60 ingredients and 18 small-batch dressings to choose from, first-time diners may wonder just where to begin.

At the walk-up counter, the lavish array of ingredients resembles an edible rainbow: tri-colored carrots, gold and purple beets, shiny grape tomatoes and lively

green lettuces. With olives, onions, peppers and cheeses, plus falafel, bacon, steak and shrimp, it's fair to say that most anything is possible.

Luckily, Chopt's menu suggests more than a dozen sure-fire favorites. They range from a classic Cobb to a modernized kale Caesar to a Mexicali vegan salad so rich with avocado, hearts of palm and spicy dressing that few will miss the cheese.

And here's what's unusual: A server, called a "Chopr," doesn't merely take orders and assemble plates. Once a customer selects the ingredients, the Chopr places them on a large cutting board, and with a curved-blade knife called a mezzaluna, energetically chops all the ingredients together, then tosses them with dressing just before serving. That means the flavors of the almonds, apples, cranberries, and croutons all blend together. The roasted squash and scallions combine with the goat cheese, or the feta, or the Parmesan. Or, all three.



Build, Chop and Serve

The Mexicali vegan salad is so rich with avocado, hearts of palm and spicy dressing that you likely won't miss the cheese.





Every 60 days, Chopt offers a seasonal "Destination" menu highlighting ingredients from a different region of the country. Recently, a Pacific Northwest menu featured wild salmon, Tillamook cheese and a tamarind vinaigrette dressing.

Iced organic black, green and blood-orange teas, plus a tangy lemon gingerade will quench summer's thirst. There are plenty of gluten-free and vegan items, along with a kids' "lunchbox" option.

Chopt's founders believe in a "farm-to-fast-food revolution." The restaurant concept began back when Tony Shure and Colin McCabe were college students. Noticing the lack of healthy dining options, they decided they could invent salads that were appealing and satisfying enough to be main dishes. Instead of merely arranging greens and garnishes

on a plate and dousing them with dressing, the pair discovered that chopping everything together enhanced the flavors of the ingredients. They formed their company in 2001 (www.choptsalad.com).

Another Chopt in Charlotte is located at Park Road Shopping Center, and one is opening soon at The Arboretum.

Chopt works with local purveyors whenever possible. Here, they include Barbee, Barham and Burch farms; Coddle Creek Honey Farm; Goat Lady Dairy; King's Bakery and Slingshot Coffee.

Chopt in Blakeney may be hundreds of miles from the hubbub of Washington or New York, but there's a wonderful thing about food that's fast and fresh: It tastes great anywhere and everywhere. ®





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

NORTHWOOD TO GROW BALLANTYNE, BUILD ON BISSELL LEGACY



"Our strategic vision is to continue to evolve the Ballantyne property into one of the premier office/ living/retail destinations in the country," says John Z. Kukral, president and CEO of Northwood, which purchased nearly all of BCP from The Bissell Companies earlier this year. "Smoky Bissell and Ned Curran wanted one corporate partner to manage the entire property, and that was our advantage over other buyers who wanted to break off pieces of BCP."

> Ranked as the largest commercial real estate deal in Charlotte's history, Northwood's investment includes 4 million square feet of Class A office space, 600 hotel

rooms, The Golf Club at Ballantyne and several hundred acres of undeveloped land within the approximately 535-acre BCP site.

Evolving BCP

To realize the property's full potential, Northwood plans to incorporate new amenities in shopping, dining and housing. These enhancements would reposition the property's image as a destination beyond a workplace and highlight the integrated lifestyle elements of the broader master-planned Ballantyne community, which is approximately 2,000 acres.

"We want to give people living in the Ballantyne area more reasons to come into the park," Kukral explains.

To realize the property's full potential, Northwood plans to incorporate new amenities in shopping, dining and housing.

Park can be, to go from primarily corporate office into all mixed uses."

According to Kukral, this is where Northwood's broad and diverse management platforms and expertise help. The company owns Blakeney, for instance, and so its retail team will provide added value. "In addition to retail, David Ravin and his multifamily team have great ideas to bring residential into BCP. We will also merge the hotel platform here with our hotel platform."

'Newfound Excitement'

Bissell founder Smoky Bissell insisted his 600 employees were to be grandfathered into the deal — a move he and Northwood agreed would ensure not only a smooth transition but continued maintenance of the high quality that Bissell has established throughout BCP.

At an all-staff meeting shortly after the ownership transfer, Kukral outlined Northwood's plans for future development and was met with decided enthusiasm. "Our employees now have a newfound excitement and commitment because of Northwood's vision," Curran says.

Community Impact

"The Bissell organization has done a phenomenal job creating one of the most preeminent environments in the country," says Kukral. "Our goal is to continue to raise the bar and evolve Ballantyne into not just a place where people work and stay, but to add choices to make it even more attractive to everyone."

Curran also notes that from the vantage point of Bissell, one of the most appealing aspects of Northwood Investors is its longterm hold strategy. "They will nurture and enhance the assets," he maintains.

In weighing Northwood's largest investment to date,

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


aunts and uncles get together as much as their busy schedules allow.




"Page has the background and training to be an excellent and effective communicator," says Jake. "I'm basically the sideshow clown who comes in and makes people laugh."

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

The lush 26-square-mile, eco-minded resort includes several accommodation options, which include the Tortuga Bay Hotel, a baker's dozen collection of beachfront villas with interiors designed by Oscar de la Renta, and the Westin Punta Cana, a family-friendly upscale property situated directly on Playa Blanca Beach.

Be as active as you like with kitesurfing, paddle boarding, beachside yoga or tennis on the resort's clay, grass or hard-surface courts. Or, do nothing at all. A good beach novel and a tropical smoothie while lounging poolside are formidable foils for shaking off the hustle of the Queen City.


Oceanside Golf

Golf takes center stage at the resort with no star shining brighter than the Tom Faziodesigned Corales Course. With six oceanfront holes, Corales is a visual stunner that plays host to the Web.com Tour's Puntacana Corales Classic, the only PGA stop in the Caribbean.

top-10 finish that helped propel him to receiving his tour card.


"Corales is a spectacularly beautiful golf course," says Power. "It's going to be breezy, but it gives golfers of all skill levels a chance to score well. The fairways are generous, the greens are in fantastic condition and the finishing ocean holes are among the most beautiful I've ever seen."

Nearby, La Cana Golf Course showcases legendary course architect P.B. Dve's mastery with 27 holes that Golf Magazine rated as the No. 1 course in the Caribbean. "The combination we have in La Cana with 27 holes offers the best of ocean and inland-course designs, testing scratch and weekend golfers alike," says La Cana head pro George Riley. "The ball sits up nicely on the paspalum turf, always delivering a good lie. People have high expectations when they come to Punta Cana, and we make sure we deliver."

Both courses make use of paspalum, the environmentally friendly turf receptive to saltwater irrigation and able to thrive in tropical conditions.

Island Exploration

Golfers aren't the only ones finding paradise in Punta Cana. Waxhaw resident

"Punta Cana is a wonderful resort destination and an area of the island that has been carefully developed over the years," says Weill, founder of Weill Fitness, an area nonprofit providing fitness programing for children with special needs. "An absolute must visit while in Punta Cana is an excursion out to Saona, a small offshore island only accessible by boat or catamaran. The water surrounding Saona is crystal clear, and there are natural pools with starfish off extended sandbars, extralong stretches of white-sand beach and a very relaxing vibe."

Half and full-day excursions to Saona that include lunch, drinks and snorkel gear are available through several tour operators in Punta Cana.

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
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Scuba enthusiasts find an extra-special cultural experience with their dives when visiting the Igneri Underwater Museum. This underwater exhibition features 22 sustainable sculptures created by Dominican artist Thimo Pimentel. Early settlers of what was once known as "La Española" are depicted in these historically accurate underwater artworks.

For "me" time, Six Senses Spa places top priority on pampering guests. Signature treatments include Asian therapies such as Thai and foot acupressure, couple's massage and special treatments for golfers.

Sound and sustainable tourism are demonstrated by Grupo Puntacana, the resort's developer. In 1988,

the company created the not-for-profit Puntacana Ecological Foundation, donating more than 1,500 acres to create an ecological park, reserve and research facility. Environmental initiatives feature programs protecting the population of the indigenous Ridgway Hawk, coral reef preservation and expansion, sustainable aquaculture in farming tilapia and a fascinating beekeeping project, where protected hives yield not only forest honey but the rare royal jelly as well.

Dining

Dominican cuisine is carefully curated with the freshest tropical produce, just-caught seafood and locally raised proteins prepared with colorful island flair.

Shrimp sautéed in coconut sauce, served with pigeon peas rice, is a fine example of a traditional Dominican dish offered at La Yola, a marina-side, open-air restaurant under a giant thatched hut called a "palapa." The perfectly cooked sweet pink shrimp are bathed in a slightly spicy, slightly briny coconut broth and served on a bed of sticky rice.

Service is attentive, yet measured with knowledgeable staff to guide you through the offerings. Remember to enjoy a cold Presidente, the fine Dominican lager that pairs well with the area's hearty fare.

Save a visit to Bamboo for your last night in Punta Cana. The restaurant's Mediterranean-Dominican creations are inspired, and the harborside setting is cozy and intimate. Diners may enjoy a playful amuse-bouche from the chef and then be tempted with the likes of mango gazpacho with salmon tataki and pineapple froth, mushroom risotto with Parmesan foam and Caribbean lobster, grilled or baked.

Be forewarned — visiting Punta Cana is not without one significant downside. The return flight home always comes faster than you wish. $\textcircled{\mathbb{D}}$

Making Waves

Ballantyne-based SAA Launches Local Swim Event to Fight Cancer

s a land-locked city,
Charlotte might not
immediately come to
mind as the headquarters for the
official charity of swimming. But
when one considers the Queen
City's reputation for producing Olympic swimmers and swim
programs that call Charlotte home
— such as SwimMAC and Mecklenburg Swim Association — it makes sense.

Rob Butcher was living in Ballantyne in 2015 when he was recruited to become CEO of Swim Across America (SAA). One condition of his acceptance: the organization would move its headquarters to Ballantyne. Butcher says he knew a Charlotte swim would soon follow.

That's because Charlotte possesses the three components the nonprofit looks for when starting a benefit swim: a core group of volunteers; a location to host a safe, fun

swim; and a cancer research beneficiary that would get behind the cause.

As envisioned, the inaugural SAA Charlotte Open Water Swim will be held Saturday, Sept. 23, at the Lake Norman YMCA to benefit Levine Cancer

Institute. Mary McCullagh, who has spearheaded SAA Nantucket and Boston swims, will lead the Charlotte event. As

many as 500 participants — from fitness swimmers to Olympians, many of whom have been affected by cancer — will swim between one-half mile and 3 miles each.

The inaugural Charlotte fundraising goal is \$100,000. By the fifth year, Butcher expects the Charlotte swim to raise as much as \$400,000 annually, like SAA's other swims.

Charlotte will be the organization's 15th open-swim benefit.

The event is like Charlotte's 24 Hours of Booty but on water instead of a bike, Butcher says. Participants raise at least

\$400, and awards go to the highest fundraisers, not the fastest swimmers.

With a slogan of "Making Waves to Fight Cancer," SAA lives that reality. In 2016, SAA made grants of \$4.5 million to fund research and clinical trials. Since its founding in 1987, SAA has contributed more than \$65 million toward the development of immunotherapy treatments.

Prior to his current role, Butcher was executive director of U.S. Masters Swimming and served on SAA's board of directors. A former high school and collegiate swimmer, he has a personal motivation for leading SAA: his mother died of stage 4 appendix cancer in 2008.

When Butcher researched potential beneficiaries for the Charlotte swim, Dr. Derek Raghavan, president of Levine Cancer Institute, shared a list of clinical research programs that needed funding. "Because SAA is largely focused on good health

and young people and young athletes doing noble work, we agreed that perhaps a focus on some of our younger (leukemia) patients would be appropriate," says Raghavan.

SAA's business model requires that all proceeds from a swim stay in that local community. In Charlotte, the money will fund clinical trials and laboratory research spearheaded by Dr. Jonathan Gerber, director of the institute's leukemia section.

For an event site, Butcher reached out to his friend, Ben Pinegar, executive director of the Lake Norman YMCA, which has one of the few Y waterfronts in the country. Near Interstate 77, the site is essentially a private cove with 12-foot-deep water. Participants will swim loops around the cove.


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Golfers Aid Friendship Trays

What was your original "spark" of inspiration?

The altered couture styles I discovered on Etsy. But the more I searched, the more what I wanted was in my own head. That was the beginning of my "self-taught" adventure.

From where do you source your vintage textiles?

In the beginning, it was my mom being an excellent early-bird hunter at yard sales. I now have contacts that specialize in selling vintage linens. Friends and customers also donate beautiful linens to me to repurpose.

How long does it take to create a single garment?

From two hours to two days. Sometimes I will look at a large tablecloth for hours, hold it up at different angles, plan the cuts around the patterns. If it's big and beautiful, I pray over it. I have to get up enough nerve to cut it. I can't imagine being a surgeon.

Do you have a favorite piece?

My current favorite is one I dyed an eggplant shade because it was stained. It merged perfectly with a faux suede jacket I rescued from a thrift store.

Is there creative tension in creating clothes that are both art and something practical?

Mixing prints can be a challenge from an aesthetic standpoint as well as a wearable one. Certain prints and colors have a lot more range of flattery than others. Early on I decided if I could merge unpredictable elements and keep it comfortable, I would have a successful line of clothing.

What's up next?

I have big plans for my little scraps. Nothing should go to waste. I would like to see a whole separate product line produced from my leftover pieces. The customer would be informed at point of purchase that a portion of each sale goes to help a specific charity.

Anything else you'd like to share?

I am a single mother who started on a shoestring budget. My most valuable trade secret is my mom. She tags, trims, runs errands and picks up all the slack when I travel to shows. She's my amazing sweat-equity, dependable business partner. ®
