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



JUNIOR YEAR IN HIGH SCHOOL I JOINED THE SWIM TEAM. I had never swum competitively, but I wanted to try something new and the boys on the team were cute. So I dived in.

Two things surfaced quickly: My lungs were the size of peas, and the water was freezing. Most days I didn't want to enter the pool at all. The coach had me swimming laps with my head in the water clutching a kick board. His instructions were, "Don't pick up your head until you feel like your lungs will explode." 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
the premier destination for this species," Dorrian notes.

Winter is the height of orchid season because it is summer for these tropical plants. Entering the orchid conservatory, massive arches of tillandsia usher visitors into a lush habitat that imitates the three distinct growing climates of an Andean mountain, starting with drier lowland foothills that are home to succulents, including a 100-year-old sago palm.

Next is the mid-mountain

rainforest featuring a spectacular "Cascade Wall" bedecked in vibrant orchid blossoms. The final zone emulates the highland with its cooler temperatures ideal for fruit trees. This section also includes a rare vanilla plant with seed pods, as well as a cacao tree with chocolate growing on it. "If you are a plant geek, you can spend a whole day in the conservatory and be dumbfounded by the diversity of over 200 tropical species," Dorrian says.

Orchids you can see at Daniel Stowe Botanical Garden include Doritis pulcherrima (clockwise from upper right), Beallara Marfitch 'Howard's Dream', Phalaenopsis Sogo Yukidian variation 3, Cymbidium hybrid and the Cascade Wall of rainforest varieties.

#### **Elegant Beauty**

Orchids have long enchanted people for their elegant beauty, sensuality and unusual form. According to Dorrian, an orchid is three sets of three: three petals, three sepals and three sexual organs — pistol, stamen and ovum — combined into one. "That is the defining pinnacle of an orchid, what differentiates them from any other plant on the planet," he says.

Despite their seemingly fragile blossoms, orchids appear everywhere on the globe with the exception of aquatic and arctic extremes. Some grow right up to the edge of glaciers, and others thrive underground in Australia, including three species that never see daylight. Here in the Carolinas there are 65 native species.

Every week Dorrian and his staff spend eight hours freshening the orchids on display in the conservatory and main building.

The conservatory relies on state-of-the-art equipment to maintain an ideal interior



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

environment for tropical species while preserving natural resources. Water comes from an aquifer on the property. The lower story of the conservatory houses furnaces and water purifiers, along with computers that run the atmospherics and

track humidity, temperatures and wind variances — even opening windows when needed for a breeze. A special fogging system increases humidity every 10 seconds. "We used to do all that by hand," Dorrian says, "but now we have fully automated

greenhouses. This is space-age technology."

JJ Bissell, senior vice president and director of The Bissell Companies serves on the DSBG Board of Visitors. "Stepping inside the orchid conservatory in the middle of winter is an instant escape to

a tropical paradise," he says.

As part of its corporate mission of sustainability, The Bissell Companies gives a DSBG membership to every fulltime employee to encourage them and their families to appreciate the beauty of nature and the need

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#### **Orchid Tree and Show**

Through Jan. 1, DSBG is staging its annual 20-foot tall "Orchid Tree" in the main lobby, featuring 300 individual orchids and 165 Boston ferns. Dorrian believes DSBG is the only botanical garden in the country that creates one of these magnificent decorations.

Following that, Feb. 3-5, the North Carolina Piedmont Orchid Society kicks off DSBG's "Art & Orchids" exhibit with the society's annual show and plant sale, an event that features orchid displays and art, as well as classes for orchid beginners.

The theme for this year's Art & Orchids — which runs through March 19 — is "Victorian Botanicals," highlighting botanical illustrations of orchids and non-orchids from the Victorian era, the heyday of orchid discovery.

In addition to orchids, DSBG offers visitors three miles of woodland trails, a gift shop and guided tours by appointment.

"We have a special tour called the Orchid Expedition where you see the conservatory and my growing greenhouses, which are where the real magic happens," Dorrian says.

As for the fine art of growing orchids, he says a greenhouse isn't necessary, but there is a continuum of difficulty. "It goes from ridiculously easy to standing on my head and performing a black magic ritual in the middle of the night."







#### Vintage 'Big Red' and True Crafted Pizza Deliver Fun

NOW THAT IT'S THE SEASON OF PARTIES THAT CARRY US INTO A NEW YEAR AND BEYOND, you might be surprised to learn that one of the "hottest" trends making its way around town is literally doing just that. Yes, "Big Red," the vintage truck with its own mobile pizza oven, is on the road.

Big Red is the event-catering vehicle from True Crafted Pizza, a Ballantyne restaurant known for fresh, good food. When the shiny truck pulls up, chefs emerge to cook and serve everything from fresh-baked pizza to grilled shrimp to roasted filet mignon.

It began when members of the Callaghan, Gallinek and Martino families decided to take part in Charlotte's emerging culinary scene and open a restaurant. Ken Martino and Todd Gallinek traveled the U.S. sampling and scrutinizing pizza. They commissioned the creation of their own proprietary dough and opened True Crafted

Pizza in May 2013. It's a modern space with a comfortable vibe, and the thoughtfulness is evident. Co-owner Ken Martino explains, "We want to elevate the quality and the service experience."

#### Pizza Creations

Menu standouts include the applewood bacon and egg pizza with roasted potatoes, perfect anytime, even for breakfast. A hybrid of modern and traditional ingredients results in a delicious broccoli rabe and sausage creation.

These and many others are oven baked in time-honored style, but the eatery is especially favored by people who crave a newer style of cookery: pizza prepared on a grill. This imparts a smoky flavor to the crust. The signature prosciutto di Parma pizza is grilled with tangy arugula, fig preserves, balsamic glaze, and topped with Asiago and Parmesan cheeses. On chilly days, a grilled four-cheese sandwich is a simple pleasure, served with

house-made tomato soup and basil oil.

The owners had seen mobile rigs in other cities, so it wasn't long after opening their storefront that they'd found a truck of their own to be upfitted with everything they'd need to stage an outdoor pizza party. The candy-apple red 1947 Ford, formerly a farm truck, is fully reconditioned with a Valoriani oven that can reach 1,000 degrees, a large grill, refrigeration units, firewood and running water. Pop-up awnings, rough-hewn tables and lights complete Big Red's gear.

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#### **Custom Menus**

As a native New Yorker and veteran of the restaurant trade. Brendan Treyball knows all about pizza and the quirks of mobile cookery. The personable chef says, "There's a fine line between a perfectly cooked pizza and a fireball." (Not to worry — Treyball and Big Red have produced as many as 200 pizzas in an hour without incident.)

More than 50 rigs are listed on the Charlotte Food Truck Association's website. Big Red is different than most in that it's not a vending truck that parks on city streets to sell to passersby. But that's not to imply Big Red is hard to find: It's a familiar fixture at neighborhood block parties as well as golf outings at Piper Glen and The Ballantyne Hotel & Lodge. One of the Carolina Panthers booked Big Red for a private party. So did the Symphony Guild of Charlotte during its

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




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Meet Six Locals Who Focus on Wellness Despite Challenges

Two Babies Make their Debuts along Well-Known Ballantyne Roadways

ANNIE BRANNON AND DANNY FERMAGLICH SHARE AN UNUSUAL CONNECTION: their first breaths came not in the hospital or birthing center their parents planned but alongside well-known Ballantyne blacktops.

Annie's mom, Shayne Brannon, knows she sounds just a little bit crazy. She tells people she had a dream about giving birth to her fifth child in the front seat of the family mini-van — and the dream came true.

"I remember I told my neighbor I had the craziest dream," she recalls. "I don't usually remember my dreams but that morning my friend called me and I told her I dreamed about having the baby in the car."

It was November 1996 and Brannon's four older kids kept the family in a perpetual state of activity. "Life was very busy back then trying to get everyone where they were supposed to be," she says laughing.

Her oldest was in the ninth grade, her youngest in pre-school, and that fall day she and husband Mike were running to teacher conferences.

"I was in labor, but I didn't tell anyone," she says. After all, Shayne had been down this road four times before. She knew the drill.

"My labors had always been kind of long except for the one right before my daughter," she says. "He came very quickly at the hospital, but the doctors thought it was a fluke."

It wasn't.

"It happens so fast; you don't really think about it," she says. "You just do what you need to do."

They'd finished with the school conferences and were home for the night when she calmly told her husband it was time to go to the hospital. He didn't understand just how urgent the situation was.

#### Laced with Meaning

"We needed to leave the house, but he was getting his boots on and he was trying to

tie up his boots and taking so much time," she remembers. "I was like, 'Just put shoes on!"

Turns out the boots were a good call.

The laces came in handy when on the way to the hospital Shayne knew they weren't going to make it. "We got to the intersection of Ballantyne Commons Parkway and Elm Lane and that's where my water broke."

Less than a quarter mile later, she gave birth to Annie.

Mike barely had time to pull over and catch his daughter as she came out. Then he called 911 and listened as emergency dispatchers explained that he should use the shoelaces from his boots to tie the umbilical cord.

Shayne sat there with newborn Annie on her chest while they waited on the ambulance, and it suddenly occurred to her that they should take some pictures. "In my dream that's what we did," she says, "so that's what we did!"

Flashes of the dream she'd had kept coming back to her — and coming true. The one thing she hadn't dreamed about, or found out ahead of time was the sex of the baby. "At first Mike thought it was a boy; he just didn't look that closely!" she recalls.

Once the ambulance arrived,

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

they went to the hospital and mom and baby were healthy. But the family loves Annie's birth story so much they go back every year to the intersection where the now 20-year-old was born and leave a balloon on her birthday.

"It's just something fun we like to do — Annie, her dad and me," her mom says.

The Brannons, however, aren't the only Ballantyne family that didn't make it to the hospital for a birth.

"He was delivered through my shorts," Lauren

Fermaglich was planning on going to a birthing center in Fort Mill. Her first child was born in a hospital, but she wanted a calmer setting for her second.


Things didn't go as planned for the New Jersey transplant and her husband.

Fermaglich was still a week away from her due date when she had some contractions. She didn't really think it was time, so she was doing chores around the house. "I remember a lot of pain and all of a sudden I said, 'We really have to get going,'" she

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remembers. "I ran downstairs and my water broke."

She and husband Mike got as far as Ballantyne Commons Parkway and Tom Short Road when Lauren realized there was no way they'd make it to the birthing center. She wasn't even sure they'd make it to a nearby hospital.

## Stopping at Red Lights?!

"My husband is a rule follower, and he kept stopping at all the red lights and I was yelling at him for stopping!" she recounts. "I knew it was close and then all of a sudden we were on (Interstate) 485 and I could feel the head. I thought there was no way, that's not possible."

One push and Danny was out.

And her husband had just missed the exit for the hospital.

"I said to Mike, 'I just had the baby,' and he's like, 'No way.""

She pulled Danny onto her chest and could feel he was breathing. He wasn't crying, though, for a good 30 seconds and her husband was in a panic. "Mike was really freaking out because he didn't hear the baby cry," she says.

They finally got to the hospital and realized Danny was just fine.

They love telling the story of how their son came into the world — so much so they refuse to get rid of the 2007 Toyota mini-van he was born in.

"Whenever we go to the dealership, they always ask if we want to trade it in — we say no!" Lauren says. "We keep it for sentimental reasons."

I HEARTILY BELIEVE THAT ADVICE FROM THE LATE GREAT CHEF. Using easy do's and don'ts below, you can create a simple, delicious meal and a warm gathering for your guests.

## Do pick simple recipes that use a few great ingredients.

When I entertain, I start with the best ingredients. Take the time to buy fresh products that taste amazing on their own. That's just as important as how you cook it.

I'm always looking for ways to save time when I am entertaining a large group. Investing in a few quality ingredients will simplify your preparation and make each dish extra special.

Good ingredients mean the freshest produce and meat that you can buy or prepared foods like bread, pickles and cheese from a source that you trust and only using ingredients you recognize.

## Don't overcomplicate your menu.

Focus on one delicious dish for each course. Spend your time making each course impactful. Don't worry about not having enough variety. Look at your menu and create a balanced meal across the courses (see the sample menu with this story).

Also, you don't have to make everything. If you don't like making appetizers, buy one. For example, pair your favorite cheeses with fresh fruit. Pick up par-baked bread from the freezer section of your

grocery store (my favorite is made by La Brea Bakery, and I pick it up at Harris Teeter), bake right before your guests arrive and welcome them with warm, fragrant bread (yum!). Serve with local pickles or an artisanal jam that your cheese guy recommends (I love the organic Adriatic fig spread at Whole Foods) and you have a great first course and conversation starter.

## Do take time to prepare before your guests arrive.

Test the recipes on your menu beforehand. Make what you know tastes delicious. This is not the time to experiment.

Also, make as much as you can before the guests arrive. Pick dishes that you know will taste better made in advance. For example, braised dishes are perfect for winter entertaining. They are simple to prepare and well suited for produce that is seasonal in winter (potatoes, sweet potatoes, carrots, onions and winter squashes like butternut, acorn and pumpkin). You can prepare the dish the day before and warm it up during your party in time for the main course.

Put together a plan with a timeline (see next page) so that you can easily serve your guests without missing a beat at your party. Essential to that is gathering all your ingredients and preparing them before you start cooking. As my chefs at culinary school used to say to me, "mise en place" (French culinary phrase for "everything in its place") is the key to success.

## Don't forget to enjoy yourself.

Your friends and family have come to spend time with you. Create an environment in which you can be relaxed. Make sure your house is clean. Set your table ahead of time with your best plates, flatware, glassware and linens. Decorate with big bowls of fresh fruit or bunches of fresh flowers. Put on your favorite party music. Your guests will follow your lead and have a great time.

prepare salad and set dressing on the side, take prepared eggplant Parmesan out of refrigerator to bring to room temperature before baking, ready ingredients and equipment for sautéing zucchini, prepare ingredients and equipment for cooking quinoa, take out glasses for prosecco floats, preheat oven.


































# GOLF TOURNEY BENEFITS MISSION

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


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# BLACKFINN CELEBRATES OPENING

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# Champagne Powder

Skiing, Sundance and Snow-Grinch Fun Abound in Park City

COME WINTER, FAMILY
MEMBERS SPLIT INTO TWO
VACATION CAMPS: those
who love the white stuff
and those who don't. The
perfect solution is a trip to
Park City, Utah. Home of the
2002 Winter Olympics and
Sundance Film Festival, this
former Wild West mining
town turned mega ski resort
offers so much to see and
do that even snow Grinches
have a blast.


Now the largest ski resort in North America based on lifts and runs, Park City is three alpine ski destinations in one: Park City Mountain Resort and neighboring Canyons Resort, which were recently linked via the Quicksilver Gondola, plus prestigious Deer Valley Resort, renowned for its white-glove service, which includes ski valets who tote your gear from the parking lot to the slope. Each destination sports its own mountains, runs, amenities and accommodations, but only Park City Mountain and Canyons allow snowboarders.

"Park City has such a great expanse of slopes that it can't be beat for the sheer number of runs," says Russell Talley, an avid snowboarder who is a sales representative for Ambry Genetics and works parttime at Sun & Ski Sports in Promenade on Providence.

Last February he visited Park City for the first time and was astounded to discover that Park City, the Canyons and Deer Valley have a total of 59 lifts with 401 runs on 9,326 skiable acres. "I spent more time on the Canyons side because I prefer the challenging terrain," Talley says. "But what is so great is that if there is a huge crowd on Park City Mountain, you can just zip over to the Canyons."

#### **Feathery Snow**

With 300 annual inches of glistening dry powder, Park City brands itself "The

Greatest Snow on Earth." and experienced skiers agree. "We call it Utah Champagne for its feathery composition," says Basil Marcus, store manager of Alpine Ski Center in Dilworth, who lived in Park City for five years. "The snow there is epic." Talley concurs. "The quality of snow is the lightest I've ever experienced."

Activities also abound for the anything-but-ski set, starting with a guided tour of the 2002 Olympic Games venues and virtual ski-jump experience at Alf Engen Ski Museum. For an extra rush, take a chillerdiller ride on the Comet Bobsled accompanied by a professional pilot at the Olympic park.

Other off-the-slopes fun includes dogsledding, snowmobiling, snowshoeing

BALLANTYNE MAGAZINE WINTER 2016-2017 and the latest winter fad — fat tire biking down packed trails on bikes similar to the Mukluk by Salsa Cycles, available for rent at local cycle shops. Eric Pollard, ambassador for Salsa Cycles, recommends the Round Valley trail system but adds that most paths hiked or with snowshoe traffic are also good bets. For non-snow fun, you can indulge at topnotch spas or take a midnight dip in a heated pool beside moonlit snow.

## Dining in a Snow Globe

With more than 100 restaurants, Park City offers foodie haunts of every kind. Casual favorites include El Chubasco for its salsa bar; Sammy's Bistro, perfect for a quick lunch; Squatters Roadhouse Grill, a brew pub with outstanding food; and Red Banjo Pizza Parlour, Park City's oldest restaurant.

Notable fine dining spots include the new Tupelo Park City; Riverhorse on Main, a Forbes Travel Guide four-star award winner for 16 years; and The Mariposa, rated No. 1 in Utah by Zagat for food and service.

The most memorable meal to be had, though, is at Fireside Dining in Empire Canyon Lodge at Deer Valley. You enjoy four courses prepared at blazing hearths, all while gazing out the lodge's immense windows that create the sensation of sitting inside a snow globe with fluffy white flakes swirling about you. For an added treat, take a short sleigh ride before the dessert course. This restaurant is so popular, though, that you should make reservations well in advance.



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### Getting There, Club Trip

Traveling to Park City is a snap compared to most U.S. ski destinations. Just fly direct to Salt Lake and then hop a shuttle bus that zips you to town in 35 minutes. There's no need to rent a car because Park City's free local transport system takes you everywhere.

Once there, Park City and Deer Valley boast 100 lodging options, including all the name-brand hotels. At the top end are Montage Deer Valley, Stein Eriksen Lodge or in-town favorites Main & SKY and the Waldorf Astoria Park City. Valley Resorts offers upscale condo or home rentals. During

Founded in 1985, the Sundance Film Festival takes center stage Jan. 19-29 at 12 theaters in Park City. A project of the nonprofit Sundance Institute started by actor Robert Redford, the festival selects approximately 200 feature-length and short films for screenings in Park City and three other Utah locales. Last year 46,000 movie buffs attended the event that also includes live streaming, a main-stage tent with music and an exhibition of new media work, along with glowing fire pits, food and drinks. 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## Heart of the Home

## Guild's Kitchen Tour Features Ballantyne Homes for First Time

SIX YEARS AGO, the battery charger in Libby and Jim McColgin's robotic vacuum failed to shut off automatically, overheated and caused a fire in their Ballantyne Country Club home.

"We lost down to the studs," Libby says of the lower level. There was also soot and smoke damage throughout the house.

Their home underwent a nine-month renovation and was featured this fall as part of the Symphony Guild of Charlotte's third annual "Heart of the Home Kitchen Tour." The tour featured Ballantyne homes for the first time.

As is typical of many renovations, the one for the McColgins had "scope creep," says Jeanine DeVaney of Charlotte In-Vironments, who designed the project. In addition to renovating the damaged

basement, the McColgins refurbished their main-level kitchen and surrounding areas. The basement also included a kitchen.

Libby says a must-have feature of the basement renovation was a Miele built-in coffee machine for her husband — a trend seen in many of the eight kitchens on the tour.

#### **Asian Flair**

What set the McColgins' apart was how the couple incorporated art they collected from living and traveling in Southeast Asia for Jim's work in the energy industry.

The main-level kitchen has a valance over the sink that conjures a kimono. In both kitchens, vertical glass backsplashes evoke bamboo, and

the cabinetry is mahogany, indigenous to Asia. The McColgins worked with Custom Interiors by Rebecca on the decorating.

At the heart of the renovation was accessibility, says DeVaney. Midway through construction, the McColgins decided to add an elevator to help elderly family members navigate the floors of the home.

Meanwhile, Cheryl and Mark Jensen's Ballantyne home featured a lighter color palette than the McColgins' home. It also showcased an open floor plan that provides what DeVaney refers to as the "lifestyle triangle"— space for cooking, dining and living.

After all, "the best parties are in the kitchen!" says DeVaney, who designed the Jensens' renovation as well. Andrew Roby provided the general contracting.

"The Jensen family trusted us enough by the end of the project to take a two-week vacation," says Roby project manager Drew Devine. "All the planning was done at the front end. They decided they didn't like the kitchen anymore. It had an old-world flair. The economy had turned for the better, and they wanted a brighter, fresher, more open plan. Cheryl is quite a cook, too."


### **Tastings**

Since cooking — and eating — are central to kitchen living, tourgoers were treated to tastings at each location. At the McColgins' home, True Crafted Pizza, OGGI and Ballantyne Country Club provided the catering. At the Jensens' home, Nothing Bundt Cakes, Publix and Southminster offered samples.

Barbara Kopald and Mary Staton, co-chairs of the tour, say they were excited to feature Ballantyne homes because it helps them increase Symphony Guild awareness in the area. "It was also fun to include the local merchants," Kopald says.

According to Chris Rydel, manager of the Youth Orchestras, 49 kids participate from the 28277 ZIP code. "These kids have dedicated themselves to a passion," she says.

Parrish Patel, Rishi's father, adds: "The guild supports all these young musicians and provides a great benefit for them, especially the camps. The guild provides enriching experiences that they'll have for the rest of their lives."


"Homeowners are now putting in custom features. A big wave of renovations is coming," he predicts.
